OF HIGHGATE

Chosen as a Compromise by the Liberal Convent on To-day at Ridgetown.

Only Two Other Names Were Allowed Special to The Planet.

Ridgetown, Oct. 21, 3 p. m.-John Les, of Highgate, has just been voted the nomination as candidate in the Liberal interests in East Kent at the convention now in session. He was chosen by a large majority vote. The only other names that were allowed to go before the convention were George Johns, of Bothwell, and

Mr. Jull, of Ridgetown. Mr. Lee is said to be an unwilling candidate. A week ago he stated in Chatham that under no conditions would be accept the nomination and the Chatham Liberal organ ridiculed the statement of The Planet that Mr. Lee was the dark horse of the machine.

His selection is a compromise, with a view to setting aside once and forever the large number of aspirants, whose earnest and energetic party services entitled them to recognition, and their strong following of enthusiastic friends. Provincial Organizer Alex. Smith. and Hon. Mr. Harcourt are present, and are understood to have manipulated the deal.

SEVERE STORM

Was Experienced by the Schoor Kolfage on Lake Huron.

Snow squalls and bad weather generally did the schooner Kolfage experience while coming down from the north shore of Lake Huron with a cargo of lumber for Blonde Bros. &

Speaking this morning, Capt Mac-donald said, "Yes, we had a pretty rough sime of it, and, at one stage, we had all things packed up ready to take to the life boat. We had a narrow, squeak of it. As it was we had our jib boom sarried away. The trouble started with the dragging of our anchor in Saugeen harbor, and in effort to make fast a line to the pier our yawl capsized. I saw there was nothing for it but to put out into the lake, as I thought I would just as soon be drowned in deep water as in shallow. The wind blew from every direction, and was accompanied by snow squalls. I ran to seek shelter in Goderich Harbor, but the wind shifting I altered the course, and headed for the St. Clair River. The wind was blowing very stiff, and was keeping us so close into shore that we were in grave danger, of being wreck on Kettle Point. I had to put out all prepared for the worst. The schooner Fulton was in Saugeen harbor, too, but she was not so fortunate. She dragged her anchor and stranded, She is laden with cedar posts and is half full of water. The Fulton lay here one winter, tied behind the gas works. That was about the winter of 1893 or 1894."
