QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS Miscellaneous.

LAMENESS-SICK HENS.

Hens take lame, and after moping around for two or three weeks, die. Their combs are white, and they have diarrhose. The henhouse is large and warm, but damp.

Ans.—The lameness is probably due to lack of bone-forming material in the food, and to the dampness of the quarters. Do feed heavily, but give some bonemeal in the food. Endeavor to make the house dry by first getting it upon dry ground; then, if necessary, raise it up, and fill in with dry said, gravel or loam. Give plenty of sunlight and fresh air, with exercise and pure water. Try changing the food, and note what a successful poultryman says in this issue about feeding.

RENOVATING AN ORCHARD.

I have a good apple orchard, which, of late, bears scrubby apples; also a grapevine which is growing wild, and bears no grapes. Please let me know the best method of trimming those to J. D. McM. bear good fruit.

From the meagre information given, it is difficult to say what is the trouble with your apple trees that they should bear scrubby fruit. It may result from any of the following causes: lack of cultivation, lack of sufficient pruning, or lack of proper spraying. Apple trees often bear well when grown in sod, but for the best results the prohard should be thoroughly cultivated from early spring until about the middle of July. after which it should be seeded down with a cover crop of hairy vetch, crimson clover, or something of that nature. The trees should be pruned regularly every spring, thinning out enough of the super-fluous wood to admit sunlight to all parts of the tree; and to insure sound fruit, free of scab, the trees should be sprayed thoroughly with the combined Paris green and Bordeaux mixture. The first spraying should be given before the buds open, and the following sprayings at intervals of ten days or two weeks, as long as may be necessary.

Grapevines should have the same cultivation as that recommended for apple trees, and should be pruned carefully every spring, so as to thin out most of the wood, leaving not more than about forty new buds to a full-grown vine. The method of pruning and training is not of so much importance, so long as the wood is reduced so as to leave not more than thirty-five or forty buds.

POTASH MANURES.

Kindly inform me of the analysis of muriate of potash. I find my land, with other fertilizers, requires 75 lbs. of the above to the acre, and as I have wood ashes I should like, if possible, to use them, with anything else required to have the same effect as muriate of potash. J. M. C.

Ans.-Muriate of potash is the name given to a variety of potassium chloride, and may vary in composition. The common variety used for fertilizer may be said to contain about 40 per cent. of real potash as it is taken from the mines and refined, but there is no certainity of its composition when sold as a fertilizer, unless the dealer gives a guarantee of its Nowadays dealers will composition. furnish fertilizers containing from two to 50 pet cent. potash, compounded from the sulphate of potash—a better form for most crops than the muriate. Muriate may answer well enough for clover, peas, grass, corn, or the ordinary root crops, and it is comparatively cheap; but it is not suitable to use upon potatoes, sugar beets or tobacco. Potash manures are of particular benefit upon pastures, meadows or clovers, as they induce the growth of clover in the former lands, and encourage it in the latter. In a dissuch as that of Muskoka, we should imagine that wood ashes would be easily available, and would answer well where potash is required. Wood ashes may vary in actual potash from two to ten per cent. If seventy-five pounds of the actual muriate of potash is applied, it would mean the application of about fifty or sixty pounds of real potash. To apply this much potash in the form of wood ashes, would require about 1,000 A, W. SMITH, Maple Lodge, Ontario. pounds of five per cent. real potesh.


