Christian Endeavor.

The Christian Endeavor Society met in the basement of the Presbyterian church on Tuesday night, the president, J. H. Moore in the chair. The topic for the week was "The Promised Land and how to reach it," Rev. 21, 1-7, 22-27. The leader for the evening was Mr. George Gray, who read a very well prepared paper on the above topic. He was followed by many of the active members of the society reading scripture texts bearing on the subject, some making more extended remarks on the same. The following is a condensed report of proceedings in regard to the topic of the evening. Our knowledge of the promised land is necessarily imperfect, but God has graciously in his word come to our capacity of understanding, and under the similitude of earthly things which men do most value and strive after. He has represented to us the glories of the promised land, and given us the gracious assurance that though now we can only know in part, yet we shall know hereafter as we are known. Now we see through a glass darkly, but then face to face. In the lesson the Promised Land is represented as a new heaven and a new earth the holy city, new Jerusalem coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband, a city in which God himself shall dwell with men. He shall be their God and they his people. God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes, and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow nor crying, neither shall there any more pain; for the former things are passed away. There shall be no more curse, but the throne of God and the Lamb shall be in it; and his servants shall serve him; and they shall see his face; and they shall be like him, for they shall see him as he is. In that promised land the servants of God enter into the joy of their lord. In his presence is fulness of joy and at his right hand there are pleasures forevermore. They offer up the sacrifice of praise to God continually. The Lamb which dwell amidst the throne shall lead them unto the fountain of living water and shall give them to eat of the hidden manna. They shall eat of the fruit of the tree of life which is in the midst of the paradise of God. The second and all important part of the topic, "How can we reach the Promised Land," is clearly pointed out in Gods word. We must prepare for it here in this world. By believing the record that God has given of his Son in his word God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have everlasting life. The answer given by one of the elders to the question, "What are these which are arrayed in white robes? and whence came they?" was, "These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne." We must receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour. We must obey his call to follow him. He has promised to receive us and give us life everlasting. He that heareth my words and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation, but is passed from death unto life. Life begun here and is perfected in the promised land. The topic for next week will be "Christ, the Great Physician" Mark 2, 1-17. Miss S. Zinn, leader.
