SIMCOE SAILOR RUNS ON ROCKS

Aboard Steamer Stranded Near Duluth; News From Simcoe

(From our own Correspondent) Simcoe, June 1.—The Duluth News-Tribune of May 27th, gives the following report of the stranding of the freight steamer, on which Douglas Porter, son of our townsman John Porter is spending his summer as look-out. Douglas, however, was not on watch at the time.

The young man sent home the following narrative of the accident: "We all, I've been shipwrecked. The Sunday morning at 7.30 in the morning. We had to lower one of the boats and take the mate ashore, and port, to get a tug. Just as he got there, a Canadian steamer reported our plight. So his walk was all for nothing. The tug arrived at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, and had to work any place broken on her bottom. The only damage was two blades broken off the propeller and the time was lost."

The young man, Porter, got his sea legs in the Vigilant in 1916, and served on the same craft during the season of 1917. He was one of the boy crew who relieved soldiers for overseas, and himself inclines to the navy.
