### HORSE THIEF GETS AWAY WITH \$250

Sold a Stolen Team of Horses to Sympathetic Mr. Fraser of Riversdale.

SASKATOON, Jan. 2.—A short time ago a young man with a team of horses that were in very good condition drove up to the feed stable managed by Mr. Fraser in Riversdale, and made a deal with him and sold the horses, which afterwards proved to have been stolen animals, and the criminal escaped.

The young man told Fraser a sad story of how his mother had been taken seriously ill, and also how, through unfortunate circumstances, his store of cash had run low and he was financially embarrassed, so much so that he must sell his valuable team to enable him to reach his home and see his mother before she passed away.

His plying appeals and his tears of sad regret touched the heart of his hearer, and when asked what price he wanted for the horses the sum of \$250 was demanded, and it was considered a good bargain.

Mr. Fraser paid the money spot cash and added the newly purchased team to his possessions, but only for a short time. A day or two after the transaction had been made a farmer called at the stable and claimed to be the owner of the animals, and said that the young man who had sold them had borrowed the team from him to drive around the town, but when they were placed in the hands of the police, he had found he had bought a ticket for Battleford, or some town west of Warman, but when a search was made for the culprit no trace of his whereabouts was discovered.

It is believed that instead of going west from Warman he took the train east to the United States, and so escaped capture and discovery. The police are still looking for their man, but it is doubtful if any success will be attained as some time had elapsed between the date of the sale and when the search was made.

### PATERSON'S COUGH DROPS

They will cure REAL, BLOODY DUEL FOUGHT IN FRANCE

Between Officers, One of Whom Was Seriously Wounded—Had Been Close Friends.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—A dispatch from Paris says that a real duel took place Wednesday near Paris and, as usual on such rare occasions when such meetings are serious, nothing is being allowed to become known beyond the fact that the principals were young French officers, Lieut. Spitzer and Lieut. Andrew, previously received serious wounds in the abdomen.

What distinguished the duel from ordinary ones was that regular arm revolvers were used and that at the order to fire each combatant was allowed to fire as many as 25 cartridges, with which each was provided, if he could.

The scene of the encounter was at Sabliere, near Versailles, and the duel is said to have occupied only a few minutes. The adversaries were placed 30 metres apart and fired at the word. Six shots were exchanged when Lieut. Spitzer staggered, dropped his revolver and fell into the arms of his seconds. Lieut. Andrew, without a word to his opponent or the doctor, departed. The wounded man was transferred to a nearby restaurant, where it was found that the bullet had penetrated his abdomen.

High Officials Doomed to Die

Revolutionaries Condemned 27 of the Leading Russian Functionaries to Violent Deaths.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 4.—Searches by the police in this city and in Moscow revealed lists containing the names of 27 of the highest functionaries who have been condemned to death by the revolutionaries.

The Novoe Vremya publishes a sensational report of a plot against high government officers who were about to meet to discuss financial matters. The plot was discovered through suspicions that were aroused by inquiries over the telephone as to the hour at which the meeting would adjourn.

The officials of the guards are studying a list of 4,000 persons of the educated classes who are under suspicion and the League of the Russian People, otherwise known as the "Black Gang," has another list containing the names of 750 other persons.

It is charged that the Black Gang has offered a reward of \$50 for the assassination of Prof. Mellukoff and Joseph Hossen, both leaders of the Constitutional Democrats.

### BOERS WILL FIGHT BATTLE OF BALLOTS

Will Struggle at the Polls to Secure the Political Mastery of the Transvaal.

JOHANNESBURG, Jan. 2.—At last the political campaign in the Transvaal may be said to have opened. The preliminary manoeuvring has taken an unreasonable time, but the forces are now fairly in position. True, the army of Het Volk has not reached the ground, but the sympathies of its leaders are so well known that no one doubts upon which side its forces will be ranged up.

In the meantime the Boer generals observe a discreet silence regarding their plans. There is reason to believe that no orders will be issued until practically on the eve of the fight. But drilling is quietly and vigorously going on. The Boer electors will march to the political battlefield ready to the last shoulder strap. The ideal which animates them is unmistakable. The power lost in war is to be regained in politics.

By keeping the British divided and maintaining a machine-like unity in their own ranks the Dutch leaders figure they can hold the balance of power in their hands once more.

SHIPMENTS FELL OFF

Shortage of Cars Injured Export Trade of Medicine Hat District.

MEDICINE HAT, Jan. 4.—During the year ending December 10, 1906, there has been shipped from the Medicine Hat district 1,521 head of horses, 13,596 cattle, 12,371 head of sheep and 292,250 pounds of wool. The shipments of cattle exceeded those of last year, while all the others show a falling off. There would easily have been 1,500 more cattle shipped this year had it not been for the shortage of cars.

### GALICIAN WAS BRUTALLY MURDERED AT ROSTHERN

Body of Michael Kaminsky Found Hanging Over a Fence—Murder Supposed to Have Been Result of Fight Over a Girl, Who Was an Eyewitness—Maxim Stadnek Arrested

ROSTHERN, Jan. 4.—Leaning over the fence, with the head badly crushed, the body of a young Galician named Michael Kaminsky was found in front of the residence of J. J. Priesen of this place. He had been cruelly murdered. His face was cut and slashed horribly, and huge blood clots had formed over the eyes and had become frozen. The body was still warm when discovered, and was a most ghastly sight.

The murder, it is believed, occurred as a result of a fight over a girl, who is supposed to have been an eye witness to the tragedy. She refused, however, to tell the name of the alleged murderer. The sweating process will liberate the worm out her story. Both she and the murdered man are from near Aberdeen.

The Inquest.

Coroner Stewart held an inquest last night, the following jury being sworn: John Ham, foreman; J. G. Weatherly, H. L. Priesen, Rev. S. F. Brown, J. D. Buller, Fred. Henschell, Frank Klassen, A. A. Cummings. After viewing the body, the jury ordered postmortem, and the inquest was adjourned until tonight. Many witnesses are being held by the police.

It is surmised that the fight started near the elevators, and after the "murderous attack, the dead man was placed on a sleigh, taken to the position where it was found later. The sleigh and foot marks were seen at that point, but there were no signs of a struggle. People passing the spot a few minutes previous to the body being found, but nothing was seen. No arrests have been made yet.

ROSTHERN, Jan. 4.—That Michael Kaminsky died of his death from blows upon the head which from the evidence were sufficient to cause death, and that they were inflicted with malicious intent by some persons or persons to us unknown, was the verdict arrived at by the jury in the coroner's inquest tonight.

WHERE WOMEN VOTE

Women's Influence in Politics Works Well in New Zealand.

MONTREAL, Jan. 2.—New Zealand is a wonderful country in a great many ways—wonderful in its soil and in its superb climate, wonderful in its intelligent and enterprising population, but, above all, wonderful in its peculiar political and social institutions. And not the least wonderful of these institutions is the general voting amongst women and the intense interest taken in political questions by the female portion of the population.

But neither are we a nation of "suffragettes," said Mr. Frederick Hyde, of Wellington, N. Z., who was in this city during the past couple of days. "Our women take interest in politics and have a good understanding of political values and merits, but they are not the less good housekeepers, good wives, and good mothers."

"What effect have women had in the politics of the islands; what has been the result of their influence?" was asked.

"Their influence has been in every respect a good one," was the answer. "Through them politics have become very perceptibly cleaner and purer. They attend political meetings, and now they see before them. Speakers as well as audiences are very much more careful what they say and how they say it when they know that there are many women listening to them. The result of this is that the women go without fear to political meetings and to polling booths, because they know that nothing will be done that might annoy or shock them."

"But what have they done in matters of policy?"

"In this respect, too, their influence has been excellent, as they have throughout steadily supported reform and the new ideas. They have not looked it less whether a thing was sanctioned by ancient precedent or not, but have, as a rule, considered the subjects in themselves, and voted for them according to their merits."

### J. I. CASE CO. MAKE REGINA HEADQUARTERS

Reported That Great American Threshing Machinery Co. Will Establish Head Office for Entire Canadian West in This City—Eighteen Large Wholesale Concerns Now Negotiating for Warehouse Sites

WINNIPEG, Jan. 4.—Your representative today called at the head office of the Nicholas Shepard Co. here in regard to the rumor that the firm would in the near future move their headquarters further west.

Manager Tecktonius was not in the city, but the man in charge confirmed the rumored change.

"You are moving your headquarters further west?" was asked.

"Yes," was the reply.

"It is rumored that the firm will establish their Canadian headquarters at Regina, is that correct?"

"You bet it is," was the reply.

The firm will maintain a transfer office in Winnipeg only, but most of the business of the concern will be handled from the Saskatchewan capital. The tremendous business being done in the new province, principally in Saskatchewan, warrants the change. Manager Tecktonius is believed to have gone to the headquarters of the company at Battle Creek, Mich., where the details of the transfer will be effected. It is reported that the firm has already secured a site in Regina and that they have started construction on a large building to be used as a warehouse and head office in Canada. Just when the transfer will take place has not been decided on.

The above despatch confirms circumstantially the report received here this week to the effect that the immense threshing machinery firm of Nichols, Shepherd & Co. had decided to make Regina their Canadian headquarters.

Hard upon this important announcement comes the report, the importance of which it would be difficult to overestimate, that the J. I. Case Threshing Machine Co. have decided to make Regina their headquarters for the Canadian West, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Calgary being worked as branches from the office here. While this report has not been yet officially confirmed, there appears little room to doubt its accuracy as to the informant of The Leader is a man who, as a rule, is well posted. With the J. I. Case people, as a deciding factor is Regina's central position and its unique facilities as a distributing point.

The present year promises to surpass any previous three years in Regina's history in the establishment of wholesale concerns in the city. At the present time no less than eight or ten large wholesale firms are negotiating for warehouse sites and many others are known to contemplate establishing themselves here during 1907.
