READ YONGE AND ESCOTT COUNCIL.

A special meeting of the municipal council of Rear Yonge & Escott was held yesterday afternoon. All the members present. After transaction of some unimportant business, a deputation from Road Division No. 1, Temperance Hall, was heard in relation to a grievance they claimed to have regarding the appointment of Alex. McDougall as overseer. They claimed that the overseer wanted them to work on a piece of road that was not in their road division and which they objected to do so on the ground that the opening of the road was unnecessary and by their commencing to do Statute Labor on that piece of road would be practically accepting the same for all time. Mr. McDougall was present and gave reasons why he wanted the work done there. A heated altercation took place between the parties, the spokesman of the party from the road division finally declaring that they would not work under Mr. McDougall but would allow the work to be returned as un-done, and save the amount due collected in the fall with the taxes. Mr. Wright finally moved, seconded by Mr. Mackie that the Statute Labor in Division No. 1 be done within the bounds of the old division; and the matter dropped.
