Phillips, Toronto, that Christ did not die merely as a sacrifice for the sins of the world, but came to reveal the plan of salvation, and illustrate by His example the way for men to live. The Methodist teaching in reference to Christ's death and sacrifice runs as follows: "The offering of Christ once made is that perfect redemption, propitiation and satisfaction for all the sins of the whole-world, both original and actual; and there is no other satisfaction for sin but that alone."—Whig.

**ODDFELLOWS ANNUAL SERVICE.**

A Large Audience Listens to an Excellent Sermon Delivered by the Rev. Wm. H. Thompson, of Athens, at the Oddfellows Church.

On Sunday last the members of the Athens lodge of Oddfellows, with brethren from Delta and other places, assembled in the lodge room at 2 p.m. for the purpose of attending divine worship. Immediately after opening lodge an adjournment was moved and the members were marshalled for church parade by Conductor W. M. Stevens. Nearly seventy members were in the procession.

Service was to be conducted at Christ church by the rector, Rev. Wm. H. Thompson, and the Oddfellows were soon comfortably seated in that neat edifice. After the opening part of the beautiful evening service the church had been said and sung, the rector delivered a fine sermon from Galatians 2:20—"Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ." The discourse was suited alike to the occasion and to the Easter season. After speaking for some time of the risen Christ, the rector declared that the only way of transition devolved his address to establishing the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, which constitute the corner-stone of Oddfellowship. The service was one of the finest ever preached to Athens lodge and met with the favorable appreciation of the very large congregation present.

At the close of his address he made a highly commendatory reference to the I. O. O. F. Quoting from the annual report of the grand lodge of Ontario, he said that the total sum expended for relief by the order during 1891 was \$1,374,900. "This large amount was expended where and when it was most needed and, he said, it would be hard indeed to calculate the amount of good done and relief afforded by the wise expenditure of this large sum. Then, too, those in sorrow and distress had the comfort of knowing that there was in their own town a company of men banded together for mutual counsel, mutual aid, and that relatives of a sick or deceased brother were the objects of their fraternal regard. Such fraternal societies owed their existence not so much to education as to that Christ-like principle that is everywhere moving, in some cases incessantly, the hearts of men to perform deeds of charity and benevolence, ameliorating the condition of their fellow men."

Oddfellowship in Ontario since 1856 had made rapid progress. In that year the total membership was 605 members who had paid benefits amounting to \$299,000. In 1890 the membership had increased to 17,707, paying benefits to members in that year totalling \$71,374,900. Since 1856 the Order has paid for Relief the sum of \$694,850,966. Membership on June 30, 1891, 18,123.

The rector closed his address with a warm eulogy of such societies as had for their primary object the betterment of the condition of mankind, and exhorted the brethren present to continue in well-doing, not forgetting to acknowledge and honor the source of their inspiration to worthy acts.

The choir had prepared a special service of song for the day, in which the congregation joined heartily.

The church was beautifully decorated with flowers. From the roof of the chancel the three links, wrought in geranium leaves, were suspended. The centre of the chancel was embellished with a tastefully arranged pyramid of flowers and the reading desk was also decorated.

At the close of the service the brethren re-formed in procession and sang the hymn which was a most impressive and touching scene.

Resolutions were made expressing appreciation of and conveying thanks to Mr. Wright for his excellent address, to the choir for their services, and to those who so artistically decorated the church.

The Oddfellows listened with pleasure to a brief address from Mr. Chancy Blancher, a brother from Minneapolis, and have the promise of his presence at the regular meeting on Wednesday evening.

Mr. R. Stevens, D. G. M., of Delta was present and responded to the welcome tendered the visiting brethren.

Mallorytown lodge had been invited to attend service here, and a letter was read from their secretary expressing regret that their service having been arranged for the same hour they would be unable to attend.

Service at Delta will be held on second Sunday in May at 2.30 p.m., and the members of Athens lodge are invited to attend.

The Oddfellows thank the ladies for their generous gift of bouquets.

It has now been definitely arranged that the Travelling Dairy to be sent to this section of Ontario will commence early part of May; full particulars will be made known in due time. The object of the Dairy is, to present to everyone interested a full view of the operations of a scientific butter making, the design and practical use of latest improved utensils, and the methods of handling milk and cream for making butter. One of the Progressors from the Ontario Agricultural College will be in charge, and will explain the several operations, and the reasons therefor, test milk samples, instruct all who desire it in the use of separators and other utensils, and give all desired information within his ability. It is a good opportunity to secure valuable knowledge, and it will be to the interest of every farmer to attend the meeting.

Butter finds most ready sale during the winter and should be made when cheese making ceases during the last three months of the year, to permit shipping while fresh. I expect some of my Liverpool friends will visit Canada during the spring and I would like as many of our countrymen as possible to meet him and hear his views on the importance of winter dairying, he having given much thought to this matter. I will advise you on this point later.

The Kingston people are not very sanguine about the construction of the railway between that city and Smith's Falls. The Whig of Tuesday says:—There is no definite information respecting the construction of the Kingston and Smith's Falls railroad. A citizen remarked to-day that the bonanza granted to this road should be transferred to the G. T. R. company, provided the workshops in Belleville and Brockville are removed to the city.

A Simple Relief for Lung Troubles.

It has long been known that pine needle pillows would alleviate persons afflicted with lung troubles, and a Florida editor relates an incident in support of the fact as follows: During a visit to the home of a most estimable lady living on Indian River, this editor was told of a discovery that had been made which may prove a boon to sufferers from lung or bronchial troubles. This lady having heard that there was peculiar virtue in a pillow made from pine straw, and having none of this material at hand, made one from soft pine shavings, and had the pleasure of noting immediate benefit. Soon all the members of the household had pine shavings pillows, and it was noticed that no cough, cold, or bronchial troubles abated at once after sleeping a few nights on these pillows. An invalid suffering with lung trouble derived much benefit from sleeping upon a mattress made from pine shavings. The material is cheap, and the Christian at Work says it makes a very pleasant and comfortable mattress, the odor of the pine permeating the entire room and absorbing or dispelling all unpleasant odors.
