August, 1903. Mr. Editor,-I have just seen an article in the Renfrew Mercury, copied from The Reporter and signed by Mr. E. C. Bulford, in which he asks for some additional information about an article concerning my herd of cows which appeared originally in the Week

He asks the very natural question as to whether the \$50.00 expense per cow referred to included anything more than the amount expended in

merely keeping each cow. Before answering this question, allow me to say that I am more than ed to give any intelligent, enquir ing dairymen such information as can with reference to any knowledge I may have obtained on this subject durthe years that I have been engaged in the business. But, Mr. Editor, I am all the more ready to give this informs tion when the enquiry comes from a dairyman residing not only in my own native county but in the yery village in which I spent all the years of my boyhood, and in which I gleaned many of the ideas in dairying which I have endeavored to put in practice in the later years of my life. Allow me then to say that the \$50.00 per cow includes merely the market value of the food consumed by each cow.] may also state that my chief foods are mixed clover and timothy hay (which I buy), bran (which I also buy), a limited amount of pasture, a small portion of which I have, and another smal portion, which I rent. I also cut a limited amount of grass daily for about six weeks, which I get for nothing on ome vacant lands near at hand, which belps me out considerably during the summer months. I estimate that my pasture and the grass that I thus cut pasture and the grass that I thus cut will cost me about \$1.00 per cow, per month for about three months in the year.
