HELP IN DRAINAGE

The O. A. C. is again renewing its offers of assistance to farmers in laying out their drainage systems. The Department of Physics has a special staff of Drainage Advisers for this work. There is no charge for the service of these men, the only outlay to the farmer being the travelling expenses, which are low. As the railway fare is only one cent a mile for this work, and as several surveys are always made on one trip the expenses are divided among the several parties concerned. Anyone wishing to have a drainage survey made should drop a card to the Department of Physics, O. A. C. Guelph, where upon a regular application form will be sent, and later on one of the Department's Drainage Advisers will make the survey.

FOREIGN SEED POTATOES

Large quantities of potatoes from Ireland and other parts of the Old World are being brought into Canada and the United States owing to the shortage of the crop last year on this side of the Atlantic. Many farmers have intimated their intention of using these potatoes for seed this season and in connection with this matter the Experimental Farm has issued a warning. Potatoes from the Old Land, he says, are subject to several diseases unknown in Canada or the United States. He says also that foreign grown potatoes are not adapted to our soil climate and may not yield profitable crops. It might be well for farmers to look into this matter carefully before using these importations extensively as seed.

FIELD SEEDS

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1912 they are prepared to distribute into every township of Ontario material of high quality for experiments with grains, fodder crops, roots, grasses and clovers, as follows: oats, barley, spring wheat, buckwheat, field peas, spring rye, Japanese beans, husking corn, mangels sugar beets, Swedish turnips, fall turnips, carrots, fodder and silage corn, millet, a rye, vetches, field cabbage, clover, alfalfa, grasses, field beans, sweet corn, early potatoes, medium ripening potatoes, late potatoes, grain production, toddler production.

Any person in Ontario may choose any one of the experiments for 1912 and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received while the supply lasts. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice, for fear the first could not be granted. All material will be furnished entirely free of charge to each applicant, and the produce will of course, become the property of the person who conducts the experiment. Each person applying for an experiment should write his name and address very carefully and should give the name of the county in which he lives.
