

Career of "Steeple Joe" Lawler, the Original Steeple Climber. "Steeple Joe" Lawlor, the origin-

al steeple climber, who has just died in Gouverner Hospital, New York, was 40 years old and during his was 40 years old and during his time as a "steeple Jack" probably ascended more steeples and turored more pupils in his dangerous trade than any other man in the United States. Lawler was originally a member of the fire department and it was in the training he received as a fireman that he developed his ability as a steeple climber. While a member of a ladder company he made a record of ascending over 128 feet in a trifle over two minutes. Lawler was sent throughout the country by the fire department to exhibit apparatus and performed some daring feats at his trade of scaling the side of buildings. When he was in San Francisco on this mission in 1895 he met and married Cleo Levine, an actress. He gilded the ball on the top of the flagstaff of the dome of the Pulitzer building, New York City, five times, swinging 435 feet in the air while thousands of people below watched him with anxiety. He worked at old Trinity and Grace churches, helped place Diana on the tower of Madison Square Garden and handled the preliminary rigging on the high Poughkeepsie bridge across the Hudson. He served in Cuba and Porto Rico during the war with Spain, and superintended the build-ing of the first military bridge in

Durability of Roads. The durability of roads depends

largely upon the power of the materials of which they are composed to resist those natural and artificial forces which are constantly acting to destroy them. The fragments of which they are constructed are liable to be attacked in cold climates by frosts and in all climates by water and wind. If composed of stone or gravel, the particles are constantly grinding against each other and being exposed to the impact of the tires of vehicles and the feet of animals. Atmospheric agencies are also at work decomposing and disintegra-ting the material. It is obviously necessary, therefore, that great care be exercised in selecting for the surfacing of roads those stones which are less liable to be destroyed or decomposed by these physical, dynamical and chemical forces.

If pork is high now, it may be expected that good pigs will be in demand next spring at good prices. THE GIRLS OF HOLLAND.

Educated With the Boys and Go Inte

In Holland the mass of every class go to public schools and all mix together. Education begins at years of age in the schools, and at twelve a girl is exschools, and at twelve a girl is ex-amined and passes on for a five years' course in the higher burgher schools, of which Holland possesses seventy-two. The coeducation of the sexes is an admitted principle. In the primary schools boys and girls are brought up together, they learn side by side and are on familiar terms from early childhood without the smallest ill resulting. A great point is made of languages, and no Dutch girl of the upper middle classes is considered edu-cated who cannot speak English, French and German more or less

Probably owing to the system education in force the women | folk are inclined to grow up somewhat independent. We are told that the prejudice against women working a livelihood has almost disappeared, and even rich women som times choose a profession. They include doctors, dentists, many of them first rate, photographers and gardeners. About 1.000 girls hold posts as assistant chemists, some 3,000 are nurses, trained in the White Cross homes and on a par with the very best of their profes sion. A woman is curator of the National History Museum in Haarlem, and another holds the same post at Utrecht, while a third is head dispenser at a hospital Amsterdam. . The railway, post and telegraph offices are largely served by female clerks, who altogether outnumber the male.-London Humanit-

Good Care of Hogs Pays. Too many are afraid of a little Work and trouble, says an Iowa farmer in Farm and Home. I clean the pens twice a week. Hogs are supplied with plenty of water and charcoal to prevent disease. Air slaked lime is used as a disinfectant. With proper care there is very little danger of disease. There are preventives, but no cure, for cholera when it gets a start. I always plant a patch of potatoes for feeding hogs patch of potatoes for feeding hogs in the fall to get them to market quick. I started a bunch of hogs on potatoes, fed them sixty days with chop and cooked potatoes with a little whole grain, and the hogs made a gain of two and a half pounds per day, or 150 pounds per hog. Care should be taken in starting hogs on potatoes. They should ing hogs on potatoes. They should be fed sparingly at first, increasing a little every time they are fed, not feeding more than they will clean up. The best market for hogs is 200 to 250 pounds weight.

A Note on Winter Feeding. The farmer who has a silo filled with good corn ensilege, a little mixed hay and some corn in the crib can settle the winter feeding quescan settle the winter feeding ques-tion easily and economically, since all he needs to supplement the farm products is a nitrogenous concentrate, says a correspondent of Na-tional Stockman. 


