Ottawa, April 29.—A significant fea-ture of Saturday's prorogation was found in the fact that only 45 people were in the gallery and that only about one-half of the Senators' seats

Although prorogation was announced for 3, it was 3.55 before His Excellency arrived. He read his speech in both French and English, and, as always, spoke with much musical resonance.

His Excellency said: His Excellency said:
"Honorable gentlemen of the Senate;
gentlemen of the House of Com-

mons:

"In bringing to a close the third session of the tenth Parliament of Canada, I desire to express to you my thanks for the care and assiduity you have shown in the discharge of your important duties, the results of which are apparent in many important acts which must prove of great benefit to the country.

"I am glad to observe that the fiscal period terminating on the last day of March was, in proportion to its length, the most prosperous in the history of the Dominion, and that the present indications are that the ex-

present indications are that the ex-

present indications are that the expansion of the country's trade and revenue will continue during the year that we are now entering upon; a fact that is particularly gratifying in view of the important undertakings to which Canada is committed.

"The stream of immigrants entering the Dominion continues yearly to expand, and it is very satisfactory to note that a larger number is coming from the British Isles than in former years. The recent revision of the tariff will, it is believed, meet with the general approval of the trade, removing eral approval of the trade, removing as it does many inequalities heretofo

existing.

The Matter of Subsidies. The Matter of Subsidies.

"One of the most important of the subjects which have engaged your attention is that of the subsidies and allowances to be paid out of the Dominion treasury to the several provinces. I trust that the proposed changes in the imperial legislation respecting which you have adopted an address to His Majesty will, if enacted, go far towards removing the grievances of which the Provincial Governments have complained as to the insufficiency of their revenues.

"The substantial aid now offered towards the establishment of cold storage should stimulate the erection of those necessary adjuncts for the

storage should stimulate the erection of those necessary adjuncts for the preservation of perishable foods.

"I have observed with gratification the passage of an act having for its object the maintenance of industrial peace in all public utilities. This legislation has already been applied with success. It is confidently expected that when the provisions of the act for the settlement of industrial disputes are fully understood both employes and employers will be ready to

putes are fully understood both employes and employers will be ready to refer their differences to boards of investigation and conciliation and thus avoid the evils following strikes and lockouts.

Postal Changes.

"The arrangements lately made between the Imperial and Canadian postal departments, providing for a substantial reduction on newspapers and periodicals coming from the United Kingdom, have, I am glad to know been received with much satisfaction as a measure likely to promote a freer communication between the mother country and Canada.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

Engine Leaps Trestle But Passengers
Are Not Injured.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 29.—Two trainmen were killed and one hundred passengers had a thrilling escape from death in a wreck on the Wabash Railroad yesterday when the engine and one passenger coach of westbound train No. 27 left the tracks half a mile west of the Bridgeville Station, near here, and plunged into Chartier's Creek, forty feet below. Scores of people were saved by a circumstance which is now regarded as providential. The dead: Marion Boyd, engineman, Rooks Station; Frank McIsaacs, fireman, Barberton, O. The train was crossing a trestle when without warning the engine suddenly leaped from the rails and shot into the stream underneath, carrying the first coach with it. Luckily all the passengers were in the other coaches.

BURNING OIL COVERS BAY. Fire On Pier Endangers Lives of Many Workmen.

Many Workmen.

New York, April 29.—Fire on one of the export piers at the foot of North 12th street, Brooklyn, on Saturday did about \$100,000 damage and endangered the lives of several score of workmen, employed in the vicinity. Two men leaped into the bay to escape the flames. They were rescued.

When the fire broke out, the pier contained a large number of boxes of petroleum, and numbers of the employes began throwing cases into the river. As the flames spread they hurried to lighters and were towed out of danger.

Burning oil flowed into the bay, and the fire spread over the water for some distance. One lighter caught fire as the oil spread over the waters, and was partly destroyed. Several persons were slightly injured.


