IMPORTANT LEGISLATION

Sons Of England Supreme Lodge Held A Busy Session

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE

Yesterday morning's session of the supreme Lodge of the Sons of Engand was largely occupied in receivng memorials and petitions and in the further discussion of sessional papers in Committee of the Whole With the exception of the two Lodge again concurred in the re commendations of the committee with the result that in several respects the working of the lodge ma chinery has been simplified. Pro posals seeking the abolition of the nedical certificate for a member's wife and to relieve rejected beneficiary candidates of payment of the xamination fee was rejected. A de cided reform lay in the Supr Lodge's decision that on the docto nust rest the responsibility for say ng when a member has fully re covered from sickness. This wi render impossible the same sicknes being a call upon the lodge funds through a succession of years. In future before subordinate lodges may evest 50 per cent. of their funds n debentures, first mortgages of other legal fields they must have

other legal fields they must have at least \$1,000 in hand. The canvas for the next place of meeting has already begun, and civic booklets expatiating respectively on the attractiveness of Vancouver, B. C., and of Hamilton, Ont., are being distributed broadcast. The chances, however, are in favor of Hamilton, according to corridor talk, and the lodge colors of the Ambitious City are worn by most of the delegates.

Simu taneously with the opening of S.mu. taleously with the opening of the 28th session of the Supreme Lodge in Chatham occurred the in-stitution of a district lodge under the Schern Cross. Such was the news seceived this afternoon with loud applause in the following cable gram from Rev. Dr. Iken, the S. O E. Supreme representative in South Africa: "Inaugurated in Durban yes

Africa: "Inaugurated in Durban yesterday amidst great enthusiasm Grand Lodge of Eastern South Africa. Nine lodges represented. Accept renewed pledges of devotion and loyalty. United greetings to Supreme Lodge."

In reply the Supreme Lodge instructed that the following cablegram be despatched to Durban: "News of inauguration joyfully received. Supreme Lodge confides in loyalty of brethren at Cape and bids newborn Grand Lodge hearty welcome. Go on and prosper."

One of the most important pieces of legislation enacted this session was the creation of the "increased insurance department," to be known as class "B." By this provision members who have taken the full amount of insurance possible in the existing baneficiary department may take a policy for \$1,000 in class B. Neither funds of the beneficiary nor any other department of the society can be used to meet the claims in class B. The creation of arcserve fund for "B" is provided for by limiting the payment of any single claim to 25 per cent. of the moneys in hand antil the as essment produces \$1000 monthly.

The clause on the sessional paper covering the matter was not approved by the General Purpose Committee, but was referred back by the Supreme Lodge and will come up for final decision to-day.

Ambguity regarding "public houses" was removed by legislation by substituting "room where information are sold." The Supreme Lodge declined to limit the voting on bineficiary matters in the Supreme Lodge to beneficiary members. Two clauses seeking to give the trustees more direct control in the investment of the society's funds were negatived.

Notice of motion for the next Su-preme Lodge was given by S. W. Burns to abolish the office of Su-prem Trustees. The society being an incorporated body, it is claimed the necessity for trustees does not
