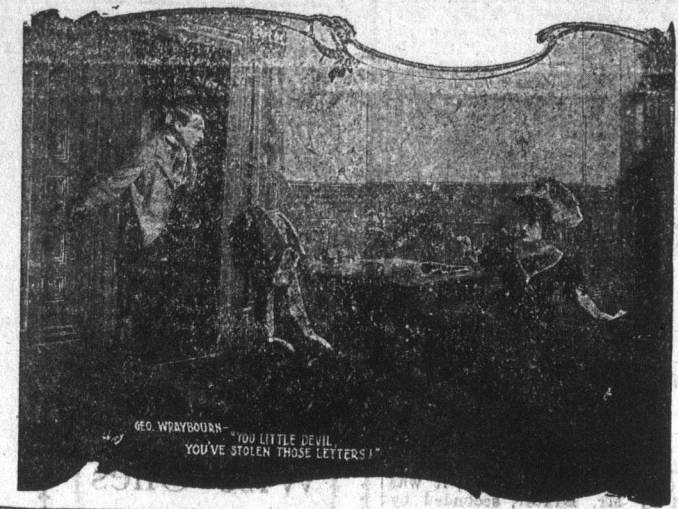

Towl, last week.

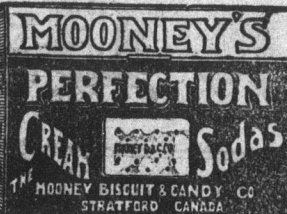

Easter holidays with her parents.

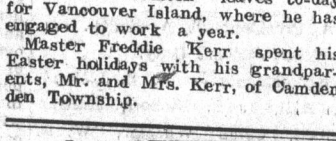
