HON. ADELARD TURGEON

COMMISSIONER OF THE DOMINION TO LIEGE EXHIBITION.

Made Rapid Rise in Life Through Brilliant Talents and Close Application to Business—Is Also Minister of Forests, Lands and Fisheries in the Province of Quebec—Took Honors in Letters and Law.

The history of the Hon. Adelard Turgeon, the present Minister of Lands, Forest and Fisheries in the Province of Quebec, and who shortly goes to Liege, Belgium, as Dominion Commissioner to the Exposition now in progress there, is significant and instructive as indicating the rapidity and moral certainly with which a man of brilliant parts and close application to business may rise to honor, writes Byron Nicholson in The Globe. Even in Canada, where it is made a perpetual boast, and not without reason, that the way to distinction is open to deserving effort in any rank of life, upward progress so rapid as that of the subject of this sketch is at once rare and noteworthy.

The Hon. Mr. Turgeon is a son of Dame Turgeon, farmer and trader of Beaumont, Bellechasse County, Quebec, and was born on December 19, 1853. He

was educated at Levis College and Laval University, at which latter institution he graduated, taking honors both in letters and in law. He was called to the Bar in 1887, and it was not long before he took a prominent place in his profession. He commenced practice in Levis, where he was at the time a resident, but afterwards moved to the City of Quebec, and entered into partnership with the Hon. H. G. Carroll, now judge of the Superior Court. In a short time he became the senior partner in the firm of Turgeon, Levesque & Allen.

The rising lawyer naturally looks to the Legislature as affording him the best and highest chances of success, and in 1890 Mr. Turgeon successfully contested Bellechasse, being returned by an overwhelming majority over an exceptionally strong opponent. He has continued to represent that constituency ever since, and the majority at each election. A ready eloquence, a striking personality, a popular man in the broadest sense of the word, combined to make him one of the most influential members of the Legislature, and very valuable to his party. Hence it came to pass that when in 1897 the late Premier, Marchand came into office it was a foregone conclusion that Mr. Turgeon, standing so high in reputation as a lawyer and a public man, should be recognized for preferment. He was appointed Commissioner of Colonization and Mines, and the wisdom of the appointment was more than justified by the conspicuous ability with which he discharged the duties of this important office. Upon the reorganization of the Provincial Cabinet under the Premiership of the Hon. S. N. Parent, in 1900, Mr. Turgeon accepted the portfolio of Provincial Secretary, the onerous duties of which office he continued to discharge with exceptional promptitude and ability until 1902, when he was promoted to the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture in the same Administration.

Hon. Mr. Turgeon is a fluent speaker, and is equally felicitous in both languages. At a banquet tendered to him recently in the City of Quebec in recognition of his decoration as a Knight of the Legion of Honor of France, and also as an officer of King Leopold's Order (Belgium), he made eloquent reference to the happy manner in which the affection of French-Canadians for the land of their sires had become reconciled with loyalty to the British Empire. "Thanks be to God," the speaker exclaimed, "this had been brought about by the superior political sense of our statesmen, by the moderation of our English fellow-countrymen, and by the sagacity and patriotic foresight of the representatives of the mother State, by such men as Lord Elgin, Lord Dufferin and the Marquis of Lorne."

Hon. Mr. Turgeon married in July, 1887, Miss Eugenie Samson, daughter of E. Levesque, of Levis, Quebec. He is a member of St. James' Club, Montreal, and the Garrison Club, and the Canadian Club, Quebec, and is a patron of several local athletic clubs, being himself an athlete of no mean order.

Curious Poorhouse.
A workhouse or asylum for infirm beasts and birds was established some thirteen years ago by a society of influential Hindus. It is near the Sodepur station, about ten miles from Calcutta, and is under the control of a manager, with a staff of eighty servants and an experienced veterinary surgeon. In the place, at present there are 973 paupers—126 bulls, 307 cows, 171 calves, 72 horses, 13 water buffaloes, 69 sheep, 15 goats, 141 pigeons, 44 chickens and hens, 4 cats, 3 monkeys and 5 dogs. This remarkable asylum is described as being most systematically and mercifully managed. The cow paupers have especially a good time of it, inasmuch as, on the occasion of the "mela" natives go from far and near to decorate and worship them.

ORANGE HOSTS ELSEWHERE.

Many Processions Take Hours to Pass Given Points.

Onemee, July 13.—Over 5,000 visitors witnessed the Orangemen's parade here of 46 lodges yesterday. Speeches were delivered by prominent members of the order.

Watford, July 13.—Nine lodges took part in the celebration of Boyne Water yesterday, and there were 2,000 visitors in evidence.

Meaford, July 13.—The Orange parade moved off at 1.30 o'clock, about 40 lodges took part. William Galbraith, of Montreal, was the principal speaker. Clinton, July 13.—Local clergymen were the chief speakers at the large Orange gathering here yesterday. There were thousands of visitors present.

Kincardine, July 13.—6,000 people celebrated the Battle of the Boyne here yesterday. Mr. Gamey was the platform speaker. The Buffalo band brought the 65th Regiment bugle band along.

Midland, July 13.—In this town there were over 9,000 people to celebrate the day. There were 29 stands of colors and twelve bands.

St. Catharines, July 13.—King William's day was celebrated here by the Orangemen and brethren from Buffalo and Toronto. The Buffalo band brought the 65th Regiment bugle band along.

Stratford, July 13.—In the afternoon there were speeches in the park by prominent Orangemen, and there were between 2,000 and 3,000 strangers present.

Windsor, July 13.—This town had its best Orange parade yesterday. The colors of 21 lodges were displayed in the procession, and there was an immense number of people present.

Southampton, July 13.—This town saw one of its largest crowds in its history yesterday brought to witness the Orange parade. Centre Bruce Orangemen presented Dr. Beattie Nesbitt with a gold-headed cane.

Toronto, July 13.—Despite the heavy downpour of rain 5,000 Orangemen walked in memory of the Boyne yesterday. The procession took an hour and a quarter to pass the City Hall.

London, July 13.—The 13th of July parade here was over a mile in length, and speeches were made in Queen's Park to 8,000 Orangemen.

Ottawa, July 13.—Eight Carleton lodges, numbering about 3,000 celebrated yesterday at Stittsville. The Pontiac lodges gathered at Alymer to the number of about 4,000.

Wallaceburg, July 13.—Yesterday there were 28 West Lambton and North and South Kent lodges in line.

Caledon East, July 13.—The "Glorious Twelfth" was celebrated here with great eclat. There were 31 lodges lined up in the procession.
