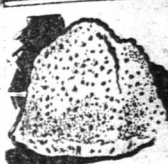

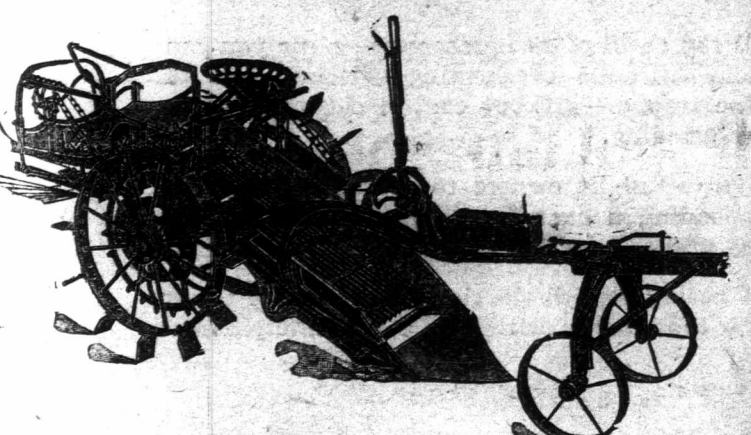

never ride again as a result of the fall.RUSSIAN THREAT  
TO SEIZE WRANGELAn Armed Ship With Troops  
Aboard Now on Way to  
Arctic Island.Seattle, Wn., Aug. 30.—A vessel  
named Red October, flying the Rus-  
sian flag armed with a six pound can-  
non, and carrying a company of infant-  
ry, is bound through the ice from Pet-  
ropavlovsk, Kamchatka, Peninsula  
for Wrangel Island, off the northern  
shore of Siberia, with orders to take  
all inhabitants prisoners, seize all  
shipping and establish Russian own-  
ership of the island in the name of  
the Soviet Government, Lt. Col. L. E.  
Broome, flight advancement officer  
for the abandoned British world en-  
circling expedition, declared here to-  
day.He gave this information to United  
States naval officers in command of  
the battle fleet here. Wrangel Island  
is claimed as American territory and  
at least one American, Charles Wells,  
is reported marooned there with a  
party of 13 Eskimos.Col. Broome also said that the Amer-  
ican schooner Herman, of San Fran-  
cisco, with Capt. Louis Vance, and a  
crew of American sailors going to the  
rescue of Wells, may be taken prison-  
ers by the Soviet forces on their ar-  
rival.Wells was left on Wrangel Island  
by Harold G. Ross, the latter went  
last year to rescue survivors of the il-  
l-fated Stefansson expedition and found  
the only survivor, known as Ada Black  
Jack, whom he brought back to Seat-

WASHED FROM SHIPCaptain of Schooner Also Went  
Overboard But Was Dashed  
Back to Ship.[The Associated Press]  
Gloucester, Mass., Aug. 30.—Three  
more names were added to the list  
of dead from the storm last Tuesday,  
when the battered hulk of the Alice  
and Wilson, fishing schooner, was  
towed into her home port last night  
by the schooner Mary, of New Bed-  
ford. The nine survivors of the crew  
told a story of the miraculous escape  
of Capt. John Hall, of the terrific  
onslaught of the storm, of crashing  
masts and spars and of long and aim-  
less drifting until rescued yesterday  
morning.The schooner, they said, had been  
drifting about five miles southwest of  
the Nantuxet lightship on the south  
shoals. Without warning the storm  
burst upon them, stripping the ship  
of masts, bowsprit, boats, deck gear  
and forecastle gang.With the gear went overboard Cap-  
tain Hall, James Holland, of Prince  
Edward Island, Joseph King, of  
Gloucester, and Manuel Marks, also  
of Gloucester. The backwash of the  
huge wave flung the first three back  
on the deck. Captain Hall grasped a  
corner of the hatch. The other two,  
bruised and battered, had no time to  
recover before a second wave again  
washed them away. This time they  
did not come back.Helpless in a derelict ship, the nine  
rode out the fury of the storm. When  
it abated, Captain Hall ordered a spar  
fastened to the stump of the main-  
mast and from it flew the flag, upside  
down.Sixty-two hours later Capt. Ambrose  
Smith, of the Mary, sighted the dis-  
tress signal of the Alice and Wilson  
and took her in tow. She was then  
forty miles off Sankaty Head, Nan-
