POISONED HIS FATHER. Levi Kipp Alleges His Mother Hired Him To Do It. Syracuse, N. Y., June 29.—A special to the Post-Standard from Canton says that upon the confession to County Judge Hale of Levi Kipp, the St. Lawrence county official to-day arrested Mrs. Carrie Kipp and William Burrell, a saloonkeeper of Benson Mines, charging them with the murder of Joseph Kipp, and alleges that his mother and Burrell hired him to poison his father. Young Kipp has been under arrest for some time suspected of the crime.
