The Steamer Lady Le Marchant arrived on Thursday, from Pictou, she brought the following items of Foreign news, being four days later than that furnished by the last English Mail.

HAZARD, July 28. The American Mail Steamer Pacific, arrived at New York this morning, bringing Liverpool dates to 12th July.

No battle of importance as yet in the Baltic. The fleet had withdrawn from Cronstadt, Prussia forcing Austria into new negotiations, -strong suspicions entertained regarding the good faith and sincerity of Austria.

Money market reported tighter—Consols quoted at 91. Flour dull, at a decline of 9d. to 1s per barrel. Wheat declined 4d. to 6d. per bushel less than last week.

MELANEOLOGY ACCUSED.—We regret to state that James Grimie, a servant in the employ of William Hazzard, Esq., who had secured the roof of Mr. Hazzard's house for the purpose of removing a flag which had been displayed on the occasion of the Temperance Demonstration, missed his footing and was precipitated into the street, he was injured by the fall that he survived the accident but about half an hour. It would appear that some bricks on the top of the chimney to which the roof was fastened and by which the scaffolding was being, gave way, and led to the catastrophe. An inquest was held, and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the circumstances. We are sorry to be obliged to add that the deceased has left a widow and six children.

Upwards of two hundred took Tea, after which the company were addressed by several gentlemen from a distance, who ably, kindly and helpfully re-echoed on Temperance, and expressed their earnestness to use all their influence, to promote and extend the noble reform, after which the declining day reminded the happy party that, however much we may wish the pleasant hours to linger, Time, with his ceaseless and noiseless wings, can not be bound, or caused to loiter on his way, the company separated, highly gratified with their evening's repast and social inter-view.—Con.
