political doath of a Federal prime minister automatically results in the non existence of his government because the premier is virtually the government as he is the sole means of communication between the Crown and the Cabinet.

The Premier, Senator Staunton continued, has been entrusted by the Crowr with the duty of organizing a government. In the eves of th Crown he is virtually the government. No other cabinet minister can ake his place Should the Premier die the government automaticall goes out of existence and a new one must be formed. But the premier must have a seat in Parliament. Sen ator Staunton contends. One who is not a member of either House of Parliament cannot be prime minister in the opinion of Senator Staunton.

A successor to the late Sir James Lougheed, as leader of the Conservative forces in the Senate, is not like ly to be appointed until an opportun ity is afforded for the holding of a caucus of members of the Opposition in the Upper Chamber..
