TOTAL IMMIGRATION FOR YEAR IS 351,595

Department of Interior Issues Figures Showing a Most Satisfactory Year—American Immigration Increased by Four Thousand, Movement From U.S. to Europe is Reported.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 27.—While only a few days of the year 1911 are left, the Department of the Interior has compiled the figures for the immigration for the year, which are practically complete. The total is 351,595, as compared with 317,959 in 1910.

The American immigration increased some four thousand, the total being 125,399. The continental immigration jumped 83 thousand, totalling this year 72,475.

Advices received by W. D. Scott, that there has been an remarkable movement from the United States to Southern Europe this year. One steamship line has reported to him a falling off in west-bound travel, that is from Europe to the United States.

The figures for traffic from New York to Europe for forty-eight days night at Quebec, the German government has informed that this matter is determined by the courts, but as this involves a long delay, the dual government are by means satisfied and are adopting measures to show their resentment.

Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador in Ottawa, has informed the state department that Germany would not accord to American exporters the Russian consular in that city. The other consulates were safe.

YARD ENGINE COLLIDES WITH TRAIN AT REGINA

Owing to Density of Atmosphere Caused by Steam, Engineers Failed to See Each Other—Came Together in Front of Station—Engineer Hudson Bled Injured.

Regina, Sask., Dec. 28.—John Hudson, an engineer, was probably fatally injured and an engine and several baggage coaches were thrown off the track in the collision of a passenger train and a yard engine directly in front of the local station of the C. P. R. about eight o'clock this morning.
