Report of the Officers of the Longshoremen's Protective Union

Your officers beg to present the eighth annual report of the Union for the year ending the 18th day of May, 1911. In doing so it is with much pleasure that we are able to point to a most successful year. While labour conditions were not as satisfactory as all would wish during the winter months, nevertheless with the opening of Spring a great deal of employment is offering to the members at remunerative wages. The relations which exist between employer and employee are of the most friendly character. Since the formation of the Union it may be said with truth that it has had the effect of bringing about a better understanding between the employer on the one side and the employee on the other.

The members, we feel assured, recognize that in those days of industrial activity and keen competition, unions among the workmen are most essential to their welfare. The altered conditions industrially force upon them the great need for co-operation and unity. Conditions in this country the past few years have materially altered. More is demanded of the workman today and a greater degree of intelligence in the performance of the duties assigned to them. Parts of industrial activity are being opened up which afford employment to all who desire it. Never before in the history of the Colony has there been such marked activity in the field of industrial operations, and at no period in our history was the demand for workmen greater than it is today. The projecting and building of railroads through different portions of the country must of necessity help to maintain a proper standard of wages.

The members must recognize that the opening up of different branches of industry calls for skilled labour. None are better paid to-day than the skilled workman. What is needed in the country to-day more than anything else are highly trained men capable of taking advantage of the opportunities which industrial activity presents, and if workmen of the country are being opened up of the opportunities offered them, they have only themselves to blame.

There are now on the Roll of the Union 2,400 members. Upwards of 150 joined during the year just closed. The receipts for the year were \$5,535.25; the expenditure \$4,123.11, leaving a credit balance of \$1,407.14.

The great necessity of providing a hall for members has been apparent for some time. This long felt want

has now been provided, and for the first time workmen who pursue the avocation of Longshoremen are the owners of freehold land upon which there is a spacious hall which is at all times open for the convenience of the members and which your officers feel assured will be availed of more and more in the future.

It is with regret that your officers have to record the deaths of 43 of its members during the year. The sum of \$3,220 was paid out in mortality benefits, namely: to 43 members \$2,330, and to the wives and widows of deceased members to the number of 24, \$840.

The financial condition of the Union is such that leaves no doubt as to its ability to meet every demand and at the same time leave a handsome surplus to its credit in the bank.

The financial statement of the Union is as follows:

Your officers desire to place on record their deep sense of appreciation to the workmen's friend, Hon. M. P. Gibbs, for the zeal and energy which he has always displayed, not alone in the interest of Longshoremen, but of workmen generally. Through his efforts the hall which we are now in secured, and we feel assured that members appreciate the deep debt of obligation which they owe him. Your officers would desire to impress upon the members the necessity of a larger attendance at meetings, especially quarterly meetings at which various reports and financial statements are tabled. The attendance at quarterly meetings is not as large as it should be, and your officers hope that the coming year will show a marked increase in attendance of members at those meetings.

Your officers are very grateful for the kindness and courtesy shown by members to them during the year, and feel that the success which has attended the Union would not be so great were it not for the fact that in all matters they had the hearty support and co-operation of members.

Earl Grey Criticised.

Special Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, To-Day.
In the Senate the Governor-General, Earl Grey, was severely criticised for an alleged slighting of Parliament by sending his deputy to give royal assent to bills prior to the two months adjournment. Senator Power led the attack, and was supported in some degree by Sir Mackenzie Bowell. Sir Richard Cartwright came to the defence of the Government, and incidentally emphasised Earl Grey's services to Canada. Sir Richard explained there was a material difference between an adjournment and a prorogation. In Great Britain the Sovereign as a rule delegates the adjournment of Parliament when such a thing occurs to Commissioners, who are the equivalent of our deputy Governor. The English practice governs ours, and His Excellency was justified in doing as the Sovereign would do in like cases. No definite action was taken.

Brilliant State Ball.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
The first state ball in the reign of King George took place last night at Buckingham Palace. It was unusually brilliant. The King and the German Emperor had previously dined together with the Royal Family. Afterwards they were joined by 30 additional members of the Royal Household, who formed a procession. The King and the Kaiser preceded the state officials who were attired in gorgeous robes, and carried their wands of office through the whole length of the State apartments to the ball room, where had gathered thousands of guests, including the whole of the diplomatic corps. Queen Mary and Empress Augusta Victoria and all the ladies wore a lavish display of jewellery.

Council Meeting.

A letter was read from Mr. James Harris of the Board of Works stating that the ashes deposited at the east side of the Museum was put there to improve the lane.

H. W. LeMessurier wrote saying that the ashes complained of by the Council men near the Customs Building was placed on Crown Land, which is not subject to the orders of the Council. F. J. Morris, the Solicitor, will be consulted.

The Government Engineer, Mr. Hall, offered 112 yards of six inch water pipe free, provided the Council would lay a service for the Hospital, along Quidi Vidi Road. The Council will lay the pipes provided the Government will pay for same and the work of excavation and back-filling.

The Council will attend to the complaint from South Side residents about the Long Bridge.

Councillor Mullaly complained of the stench caused by the landing of blubber at the dock premises.

W. Watson drew the Council's attention to Springdale Street and Charlton Street, and asked that the residents be made connect with the sewer and put in water service.

At the representation of Mr. J. M. Sullivan the City Council will shortly install sewerage and water service on Pennywell Road.

A six inch pipe will be laid on Patrick Street with the view of carrying out the work of installing a water service on the South Side. Mr. J. P. Blackwood, acting for Mr. F. W. Knight and others, is urging on the Council.

Mr. J. Jardine was given permission to erect a fence on Maxse Street. Mr. H. K. Cook was given permission to erect a fence on Maxse Street.

Mr. S. White will erect a poultry house on Freshwater Road.

Plan of fish stand for Job's Cove will be submitted next week.

The wall at the foot of Market House Hill will be repaired at a cost of \$35.

The dumping of refuse in the West End, near Waterford River, will be continued on the advice of the Health Officer.

The Sanitary Supervisor reported that over 800 loads of refuse had been removed, and by this evening he expected that the number would have increased to a thousand.

The Council released Mr. Burridge from his tender to supply stone.

The Motor Car Act will be rigidly enforced.

The Council on a majority decided to accept the horses imported by J. Judge.

The Health Officer reported four cases of scarlet fever, six of typhoid and twelve of diphtheria in the city now.

The Reid Nfld. Co. contract to water the street was renewed at \$1,000 a year for three years. The service will begin on May 1st and finish October 15th. The work will be begun at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. on all days when sprinkling is required.

The gold was composed of sovereigns which were beaten to a shreds. There is a strong suspicion that the perpetrator of this robbery is the same as the police have now in the tolls for the C. L. B. affair.

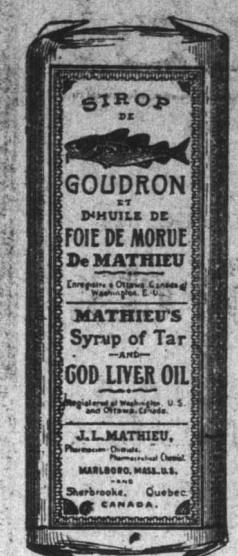
