NOTICE OF QUESTION.
Mr. Bennett—To ask the Hon. Minister of Posts and Telegraphs if it is correct that Mr. Geo. F. Morris, Postmaster at Har's Content is pensioned and, if Mr. Walter Young is appointed in his place, if such is the case to state how long Mr. Morris has been in the public service, what is his age and why he has been pensioned, also state if any returned soldiers were applicants for the position and if so why one of them was not appointed?
Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs, if it is correct that the sugar remaining in the hands of the Food Control Board has all been disposed of to one purchaser, if the said purchaser is J. J. Rossiter, if Sir M. P. Gibbs is a silent partner in the firm of J. J. Rossiter, if J. J. Rossiter received any advance information as to the rate of duty to be imposed on sugar in the Budget, and if the Government proposes to take any action to cancel the contract that appears to be of a suspicious character?
Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Minister of Shipping what was the cost of the salt now in this city and imported by the Government, what was the cost of freight, what do the other expenses amount to; what will the salt be sold at and what will be the loss, if any, to the Government; also if the P.F.U. is interested to any extent in the importation of this cargo of salt; and if so what steps are being taken to see that this organization bears its share of the cost?
Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. Three Stowaways Under Arrest.
 Newfoundlanders Arrived at Sydney on the S.S. Winona.
 Three stowaways, George Fowler, Thomas Johnstone and James Kennedy, all natives of Newfoundland, were arrested by Detective McDonald on Thursday. The three men are at present being detained at police headquarters awaiting word from the captain of the steamer Winona as to the Ancient Colony.
 The three men were discovered on the trip from St. John's to Sydney. The men told a partial story of treatment handed them by those on board the ship. According to their story the men say they were put to work cleaning the deck of the steamer on Sunday. It appears that two of them refused and were placed in the hold. One told the city medical health officer who was called to dress a sore leg, that he was forcibly thrown down a hatch for a distance of ten feet.
 When arrested Thursday the three men were said to be in a rather weak condition and they claimed they had been denied food. When the steamer arrived in Sydney the three made their getaway from the steamer by breaking through the hatch. The immigration officials informed the coal police of the case, supplying them with description. Detective McDonald located the three on Townsend Street and placed them under arrest. They offered no resistance and came quietly along to the station.
 They are being held in custody until the immigration officials here receive word from the captain of the steamer now in Halifax as to whether he will take them back or not.—Sydney Post.
