

## Hague Conference Definitely Over

Republicans Control Cork -- British Settle Shipping Claims With United States-- Privy Council Reserves Judgement in Grand Trunk Case.

### DEFINITELY OVER.

**THE HAGUE, July 13.**  
At midnight the Russian delegation issued a statement that the Conference was definitely over.

### CORK IN CONTROL OF REPUBLICANS.

**CORK, July 13.**  
Cork is in the complete control of the Republicans, who have their field gun headquarters at Clongmel, to which place they transferred from Limerick. An official bulletin says, "Heavy firing continues in Limerick city. Caher Conlish barracks in County Limerick, occupied by Free Staters, was captured after a stiff engagement. Generals Hays and Connell and five staff officers were taken prisoners."

### SHIPPING CLAIMS SETTLED.

**WASHINGTON, July 13.**  
Counter claims between the British Ministry of Shipping and the United States Shipping Board from war time shipping transactions between the two nations, have been settled with the payment to the Shipping Board of twelve million dollars by British. Chairman Laefer announced to-day.

### TAKE TIME TO CONSIDER.

**LONDON, July 13.**  
"Their Lordships will take time to consider what advice to tender his Majesty." In this way Lord Chancellor Birkenhead announced this afternoon upon the conclusion of the argument, that the Privy Council had reserved judgment regarding the appeal of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway against the award of the Board of Arbitration in connection with the preference and common stock of the railroad upon its acquisition by the Canadian Government. Opinion among counsel is that their Lordships will probably allow the appeal on the ground that the judgment of Sir Walter Cassels included matter from the Drayton-Acworth report and also because of the rejection of evidence concerning reconstruction value.

### KILLED BY TRAIN.

**HARTFORD CITY, Ind., July 13.**  
Five persons were instantly killed and three seriously injured when a Pennsylvania railroad train hit an automobile at the crossing near here.

### FIRE DAMP EXPLOSION.

**STIRLING, Scotland, July 13.**  
Twelve men were killed and five injured in a fire damp explosion at Pleas Colliery near here to-day.

### THREE DAYS ADRIPT IN FOG.

**SYDNEY, N.S., July 13.**  
After being lost three days and four nights in a fog on the Grand

Banks, three dory loads of French fishermen were picked up recently by the French hospital ship St. Jeanne d'Arc, which reached Sydney to-day. The men were restored to their steamer, the Pierre Barnard.

### OLD LANDMARKS DESTROYED.

**NORTH SYDNEY, July 13.**  
Three old houses on the Cunard property here, landmarks of the first settlement in North Sydney, were wiped out by fire this afternoon.

### DANISH VESSEL OPERATING ON BANKS.

**SYDNEY, July 13.**  
The hospital ship St. Jeanne d'Arc visited 113 vessels, gave medical treatment to 17 sailors, distributed 6074 letters, and received 2272 letters and 43 telegrams for transmission home. Capt. Beauge states that for the first time in his experience a Danish vessel is operating on the fishing banks unemployed at harbor-grace.

### MEN DEMANDED WORK.

The unemployment situation in Conception Bay, which reached a stage where the men at Victoria met last week and demanded work from the Government, has become acute at Harbor Grace, and on Tuesday several hundred men carrying a Union Jack paraded the town and demanded work. These men and their families have been faced with starvation, owing to not being able to secure necessary supplies for the fishery. Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, arranged to have a number of the men sent to Grand Falls where work is being provided for them as per arrangement with the A.N.D. Co. In all some 150 men are being sent to Grand Falls from Carbonar and Harbor Grace.

### Bonavista Branch Railway.

#### RECONSTRUCTION NOT ADVISABLE AT PRESENT.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—The railway problem has been so long before the public that they have more or less got so fed up on it that they have ceased to think about it. It is apparently sufficient for them to hear through the Premier "that ways and means have been devised to keep the system operating until some future date, with all losses to be footed by the Government, after which other arrangements will be made." It is an open secret that neither the Bonavista nor Trepansey Branches have paid a cent since they have been operating, in fact they constitute one of the greatest leaks so far as losses are concerned.  
And now Mr. Coaker says the road bed of the Bonavista Branch is in a deplorable condition and asks Mr. Morgan to have the roadbed ballasted, and 50 per cent of the sleepers renewed in order to make it safe to travel over.  
This work no doubt would be very commendable if the Railway Co. was in a position to pay for it. As it is understood that as it is, and without any extraordinary expenditures, the country is going to have to find a very considerable sum of money to make good the losses in operating the railway, it must follow that whatever repairs are made to the Bonavista Branch must also come out of the pockets of the public.  
Is the Bonavista Branch of more importance to the travelling public than the proposed line to Fortune Bay, which is now being taken up again? Or is it of more importance to the people living in that vicinity than the Portia is to the people who live on the South West Coast? How many steamers are now serving Bonavista and Trinity Bays, and cannot they meet the demands of those bays as they used before the Branch Railway was built?  
Under existing conditions, and taking into consideration the fact that upwards of 500 miles of coastline on the South West Coast is now served by but one steamer making a trip every ten days, which coast has no railway connections, I do not see how in fairness to the country at large and particularly the South West Coast, that the Government be asked to spend more of the public's money in keeping up a branch line that is steadily losing money, and is altogether unnecessary.
