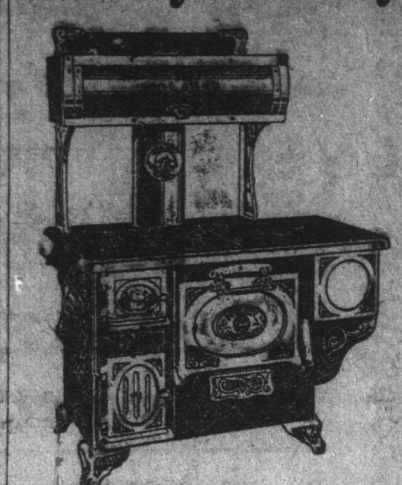

Empire Service League.

The Dominion Committee G.W.V.A. has chosen as its accredited representatives to the Biennial Conference of the British Empire Service League, Lt.-Col. T. W. N. C. P. Capt. J. E. J. Fox, and the Dominion Secretary, Capt. G. W. W. The Conference of the Empire Veterans Association is being held in London, July 14th, 19th. Representatives from F.J.A.D.C., the Aims of the Service Men's Organization of France, Belgium, and the other Allied Nations will be in attendance. The Prince of Wales will preside, while the chairman's duties will be discharged by Field Marshal Earl Haig. The B.E.S.L. being the parent organization of all the ex-service men's organizations throughout the Empire, as a very strong institution and it is wisely administered, such an amalgamation must be a factor for good. The unemployment situation throughout the Empire is one of the most important items in its agenda. Much help in this connection is expected from the British House of Commons Branch of the League, whose membership is some 110. That much good will be derived from this conference some can gain say. It is particularly fitting that Newfoundland should be represented. A dinner is being tendered the Dominion representatives by the London G.W.V.A. and a closer co-operation between the various organizations throughout the Empire should result.

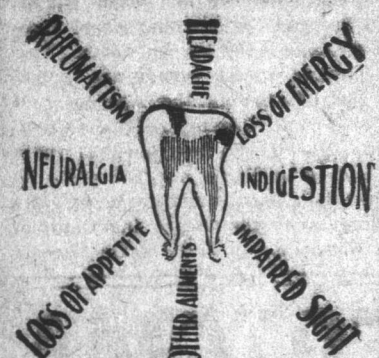
