#### A Beautiful Casket

On July 1st the St. John's Municipa Council will present Field Marshal Earl Haig with an Address, giving him the Freedom of the City. The widress will be enclosed in a beautiful casket, which is being made by the firm of J. T. Lamb. The casket is of solid silver and is encircled by a Grecian border. This border is a patorn from the iron railing encircling the Monument which the Marshai will unveil. On the front is an enamelled crest of the Municipality. Mr. Jamb may well feel proud of this crest, for the great firm of T. P. Tansey cou'd not improve upon it. The ornamenta! legs of this casket are of most artistic design. On the cover is a Caribou Head, and the engraving: "To Field Marshal Earl Haig. K.T., G.C.B., O.M., G.C.V.O., K.C.I.E., from the City of St. John's, Newfoundland, July 1st,

The dimensions of the casket are as follows:: Length, 10 in.: width, 31/2 In.; depth, 11/2 in.; height, 6 in., with Caribou Head, and 3 in. without Weight of the whole, 27 ounces.
