While the first, second, and even ird attempts were making to connect While the first, second, and even third attempts were making to connect Europe and America, by means of a telegraph, the people of the two continents stood on the tiptoe of expectation. There was something so bold, so magnificent in the idea, and at the same time something so problematical in the experiment, that people at first looked amazed, then doubted if science, powerful as they knew it to be, would prove equal to the accomplishment of what it had undertaken. The first failure damped the hopes of the public, but only excited the ardor of those who were the losers. They resolved to snatch victory from the arms of defeat, and, like sensible men, turning their experience to account, they made failure the mere prelude of success. What was considered, five years ago, as a problem to which it was doubtful whether a clear solution would ever be obtained, was afterwards so clearly demonstrated that the laying of a submarine cable, of any length, is now looked upon as a work only a little more difficult of accomplishment than stretching a telegraph wire upon poles.—Hence the progress made in laying the new cable from Brest, in France, to the Island of St. Pierre, off Newfoundland, is noted daily in a few words. Nobody seems to fear that anything will go wrong, or that, if it does, it cannot soon be righted, and when the Great Eastern arrives with the cable, it will create little more stir than if a Black Ball Liner had come to anchor with a cargo of emigrants aboard. On Saturday the big ship was 497 miles out, and everything was serene.

He might also have added, that he revived them in order to sound the depth of their enthusiasm in his cause. He accomplished his object, however, without any direct declaration to this effect, for it is written that on the succeeding day, when Marshal Bazaine presented to the Emperor the soldiers who had fought at Magenta and Solferino, he gave his Majesty the pleasing assurance that under all circumstances the army would remain devoted to his dynasty. What would ambition seek further? "If I live, said Probus, "the Roman Empire will have no need of soldiers," Perhaps Napoleon thinks if he live long the safety of the French Empire may yery much require what the brave Roman intended to dispense with.

In particular they do not like the speeches made by some of the Republican members of the Cortes, who expressed ornitons regarding religion which could not have been less than palatable to the most extreme free thinker. They are now acting evidently in the spirit of the boast of Cardinal Cuesta, that three millions of Spaniards were ready to sign their names to a pledge to resist a Constitution which asserted itself to be the enemy of the Church.
