The following resolution was then carried amid applause: "Whereas we meet for the first time in our history in our Annual Conference on the natal day of our most gracious Queen, we cannot allow the opportunity to pass without expressing our strong and unwavering attachment to the British Throne and Constitution. It is therefore Resolved, That at no period of our history as British subjects have we ever felt so deep a love for the person of our beloved Sovereign, and so high an admiration of the British Constitution as we do at present, and we earnestly pray that our beloved Queen may long live to sway her sceptre over that mighty Empire on which the sun never sets and to enjoy as she now does the love and confidence of her numerous subjects, and the esteem of the civilized world.

The appointment of the Stationing Committee in Methodist Conferences is always a matter in which there is some interest felt. The following brethren were honored with the appointment this year: Rev. G. Brown, H. Williamson, S. B. Gould, with Messrs. D. McLeod and R. Irvine.
