THE WEATHER.  
Toronto, Ont., Feb. 14—11 p.m.—Another important low pressure area, which has traveled with rapidity from the Northwest Territories, is to-night centering over the lower lake region, and the pressure is high throughout the Northwest States and Territories. A snow storm has prevailed to-day in the lake region, and it is now extending to eastern Canada. Fine anticyclonic cold weather has prevailed in the Northwest.  
Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 20° below—4°; Battleford, 40° below—18° below; Qu'Appelle, 30° below—22° below; Winnipeg, 30° below—4° below; Toronto, 8°—30°; Montreal, 6° below—12°; Quebec, 8° below—14°; Halifax, 14°—28°.

—R. J. Thorpe, manager Bell Telephone Company, Hamilton, formerly of London, was in the city yesterday.  
—A. C. Leonard and wife, of Detroit, were in the city last week and called upon Mrs. (Senator) Leonard and family.  
—Miss Mary Sinclair, late with Barker & Spence's Shorthand Institute, Toronto, has been engaged by the Forest City Business College.  
—Mr. R. A. Little, of the Collegiate Institute, has been called away by the death of his sister, Mrs. Alexander Hastings, of Cheshire.

—Mr. H. Hobbs, one of the leading hardware merchants of London, Ontario, was in the city yesterday, en route for British Columbia. (Winnipeg Free Press. Mr. Hobbs will be back in time to vote on the 26th inst.)  
—Mrs. Alden Jones, nee Miss M. Booth, who has been the faithful and painstaking organist of the Wellington Street Methodist Sunday school for the last three or four years, was presented the other evening with a handsome silver tea service by her fellow-workers and friends of the school.

—Rev. James Graham, of Strathroy, formerly of Queen's avenue, preached in Assiniboia Street Methodist Church yesterday. His discourses were most original and illustrated with the quaint anecdotes which he is noted. Rev. Mr. McIntyre occupied Mr. Graham's pulpit in Strathroy.

—The Chatham Loan and Savings Company held their annual general meeting of shareholders at their office in Chatham on the 10th inst. Judge Bell, in a neat speech, presented the tenth annual statement, which was adopted unanimously. Judge Bell, H. S. Cumming, Dr. Holmes, N. H. Stevens, James Graham and Thos. Stone were re-elected directors. Mr. Wm. J. Clark, barrister, of London, was elected a director, vice Edward Harris, of Toronto, resigned.

—A firm which proposes to start a new industry in this city comes from Toronto. Messrs. Watson and Cole, of Toronto, are the promoters, and it is understood that the Globe Works, which have been in the city for several years, are occupied at once, if the City Council makes the arrangements necessary to set the industry humming. It is understood that there is a layoff offering good terms to the new industry that would not interfere with any established industry.

A. F. Jury Coming.  
On Thursday night the electors will be addressed at the Grand Opera House by Mr. A. F. Jury, of Toronto, the well-known labor advocate. Jury is a representative workman, who has made social and political problems a life study, and he is peculiarly qualified to show wherein the present high tax system operates to the injury of his class and to set forth the advantages of freer trade relations and extended markets, which the enactment of the Liberal policy would bring about. He is a favorite in the city and an excellent orator. His speeches during the last campaign were tellingly effective, and doubtless a big crowd will turn out to hear him. Mr. Hyman, Mr. Gibbons, Q.C., and others will also deliver addresses.

THE PEOPLE'S FORUM.  
Scarlet Fever.  
To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:  
I see that "Observer" in last night's ADVERTISER has singled out only one house in London where a fever card was not put up. There are many other houses in the city where from one to three members of a family have had scarlet fever, scarlet fever, and no card has been put up. Why should this be so? In some cases the attending physician is to blame; and where this can be proven, let them suffer the extreme penalty as provided by law. Some of our doctors seem to have an idea that they can do as they like, and ignore the laws, where others conscientiously conform to them. In such matters all persons should be served alike, whether rich or poor, high or low, friend or foe.

If the cards for contagious diseases are not attached to houses owing to neglect, indifference or other cause, on the part of the health officer, then it is his duty in these and all other matters pertaining to the position. The health officer (or whatever you call him) gets \$1,000 a year for very little service. If he cannot, or will not, attend to such very important matters as those referred to, the sooner he "resigns" the better for our city.

While on this subject, I will say that I consider some of the "instructions" issued by the medical health officer in your edition of last night, are simply ridiculous, and show a decided lack of common sense on his part, but are given, I presume, to convince us that he is making a show of earning his salary. The new City Council should carefully look into these and other affairs during the present year, and see that both officers and doctors do their duty; and that all laws governing such matters are properly carried out and strictly conformed to. As citizens we are all deeply interested in the lives of ourselves and children are in great danger whenever and wherever willful carelessness of the kind mentioned exists. Yours earnestly,

THE CATHING ENDED.  
The Young Men Close Their Convention Saturday.

Concluding Sessions—Votes of Thanks—The Question Drawer—Interesting Papers and Addresses.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.  
After their exhilarating drive the delegates were ready for the purposes of the convention. Fifteen minutes' devotional exercises were conducted by Geo. Hunter, of Smith's Falls. Miscellaneous business was then taken up for an hour. The question drawer occupied fifteen minutes. How can we counteract the influence of club rooms? What should be the attitude of the association to the temperance movement? What is the work of a country secretary? What steps should be taken to organize a ladies' auxiliary? Where is it difficult to get sufficient supply of finances, would you advise the secretary to do collecting? Should the committee of committees be members of the Board of Directors? What is required from a general secretary when the call is from God? What objection is there to have billiard tables in Y. M. C. A. halls? (Answered—"Billiards, up to the limit, is universally connected with the liquor traffic. There is a peculiar fascination about a billiard table that weakens men physically, mentally and intellectually.") How can a Y. M. C. A. help a poor man spiritually? What objection is there to having boxing and fencing in a Y. M. C. A. gymnasium? (Answer—"The tendency is towards prize-fighting.") If billiard tables were not found in hotels, would they be objectionable in Y. M. C. A. rooms?

All these questions were answered satisfactorily by I. E. Brown, of Chicago, who presided over the physical department were answered by H. C. Thompson, of Toronto.

A paper on "Educational work in our association," written by D. F. W. Kelly, of Montreal, was read by the assistant secretary. The reading of good books and literature was the means of killing out trashy material. "Provide only the best when he deems it a good motto to be observed. Evening classes resulted in wholesome work. The teachers should be the best obtainable, and should be paid for their services. It recommended weekly formal talks by suitable men. A series of lectures should also be given.

SATURDAY EVENING.  
From 7:30 until 8 a song service, conducted by C. E. Wheeler, was enjoyed by the delegates. The Bishop of Huron then called on for his second address. He wished to say a few words on the subject of prayer under three heads—public, social and private prayer. It was scriptural to kneel, scriptural to stand and scriptural to sit. If you stand it shows that you are a Christian; kneel, that you are a sinner and sit, that you are an equal. The great want of the church to-day was private prayer. Real prayer was praying in the Holy Ghost. The only prayer which was real and deep was praying in the Holy Ghost. Why was it difficult to retain attention during prayer? Satan trembled when he saw the sinner on his knees. Before young men began prayer they should ask God to give them prevailing power and make intercessions in their hearts. They should wait for the Lord and he would give them strength in prayer. "We are to be in abiding union with the Lord and he with us," was one of the conditions of success in prayer. "We should know how to come to the Lord, Jesus Christ, in prayer." "In God" and "Waiting God's time" were other things to remember. When you feel God is working in you it is to say that the answer is coming.

Rev. M. P. Talling then led in a fervent prayer. A resolution of sympathy was passed to George Rutherford, president of the Hamilton Y. M. C. A., on the death of his only son. The death of a young man, and the removal of Principal Houston, of Woodstock College, was also expressed. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to all those who had furthered the success and arrangements of the convention, to those who had so hospitably thrown open their homes to the delegates; to the secretary, directors and officers of the London Association; to the visitors, Messrs. I. E. Brown, of Chicago; Gilbert A. Beaver, of Pennsylvania, and F. H. Thatcher, of Buffalo, for their valuable information, and to the Bishop of Huron for his stirring addresses and Bible readings.

The report of the sub-committee on college work was read by F. C. Stevenson, of Belleville, and adopted. I. E. Brown, of Chicago, stated that the only way to work for the college boys was to have all the associations to act as a unit. There should be a college session in every convention. In a short but able address, H. S. Tougill, of Victoria University, dealt with "Missionary work, home and abroad." The many valuable points he set forth, if weighed by his hearers, should be followed by good results.

A thorough paper prepared by H. B. Sherman, a delegate from the Ontario College of Agriculture, was read by the secretary. By the singing of a hymn and prayer the meeting was brought to a close and the convention was practically over.

THE FAREWELL MEETING.  
The farewell meeting in St. Andrew's Church last evening at 8:30 was largely attended. The choir gallery was filled with choruses rendered by them as a sort of introduction were a treat rarely enjoyed in this city. The meeting was conducted by Napleton Caldecott, ex-president of the Toronto Young Men's Christian Association. On the platform were a number of city clergymen and delegates to the convention. Rev. Canon Richardson, pastor of the Memorial Church, led in prayer, asking the Lord's blessing on the service. Mr. Caldecott said it was always a sad thing to say farewell. The delegates to the convention felt particularly sad at having said farewell to this beautiful city and to the many kind friends who had taken such an interest in them during their stay here. He hoped that the next time the convention was held in London that it would be held in a beautiful new building. The young men of this growing country needed help and sympathy from older people in carrying on the great work in which they were engaged. Not more than 6,000 young men in Toronto were controlled by the church. Looking after the young men was doing the very best thing for the prosperity of Canada. Citizens should rally around the directors of the local association and give them all possible help. Thos. S. Cole, of Toronto; Gilbert A. Beaver, of Pennsylvania; Dr. Harley Smith, of Toronto, and I. E. Brown, of Chicago, were among those next called upon for brief addresses.

Mayor Spencer spoke on the work in London, especially as regards its necessity. He compared the numerous beautiful city churches with the Victoria Hall, the only place of the kind in the city. He

urged the necessity of having a new building for the boys. He related an incident which occurred on the corner of Dundas and Clarence streets one evening. One boy about 10 years old wanted to go skating, and another about three years older wanted him to go to a prayer-meeting.

Mr. Webb, on behalf of the commercial travelers, referred to the work being done among that body of young men.

Mr. Smith, of Toronto, represented the railway men. They were a great, warm-hearted class. In one year 2,000 were killed, and 20,000 were injured in Canada and the United States.

W. W. Webb, of Hamilton, first vice-president of the convention, stated that a number of the delegates would meet the directors of the Y. M. C. A. in this city this morning.

C. R. Sayer, secretary of the local association, urged the necessity of a new building. At Victoria Hall yesterday afternoon nearly a dozen boys had found Christ. Mr. Sayer thanked the citizens for their kindness to the delegates, and said farewell to those who had attended the convention.

D. A. Budge, of Montreal, said that whatever was done by citizens toward having a new building in this city they would do for themselves. They could not afford to do without it, and the boys and the young men needed it. London's citizens should appreciate their Y. M. C. A. secretary.

Mayor Spencer was again called on for a three-minute address. He regretted that time had not permitted him to become better acquainted with all the delegates to the convention. It was with feelings of the greatest regret that he said farewell to them.

Ten minutes were then spent in one-minute addresses and testimonials by delegates and pastors. All members and inquiring members joined hands around the platform and altar of the church. "Blessed be the ties that bind" was sung, the benediction was pronounced and the farewell meeting was over.

DIED IN THE HARNESS.  
Sad and Sudden Death of Rev. J. Davidson, B.A.  
TORONTO, Feb. 13.—Rev. J. Davidson, M.A., minor canon St. Allan's, Toronto, and rector of Colborne, Ont., died suddenly of his (fatal) heart failure, at his home at 10-day of heart failure. He had been attending the convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrews, and took part in the morning session. At noon, not feeling well, he left the convention and returned to his home, where he died at 1 p.m. He was 54 years of age, and was a member of the City Council of London and chairman of the Finance Committee.

"Ald. Hyman," it said, "who has presided over that branch of the public economy for the past couple of years so acceptably, made a statement which cannot fail to be regarded in a reassuring sense. During his term of office something in the nature of a revolution had taken place in the mode of conducting financial business." He had effected a large saving in the current outlay. The real state of the city's affairs was never known until his death, and ability and rectitude were got to take hold of the matter. Mr. Hyman and his colleagues were described as "men of business acumen, accustomed to banking and to grapple with matters of finance." Mr. Hyman seems to be a right sort of man to see to Ottawa.—(Toronto Globe.)
