London, April 11.—While six army
engineers were boating at Gravesend their
boat capsized and three of the occupants
were drowned. The others were rescued.

The Queen's Plans.
London, April 11.—The Queen will
personally hold "drawing rooms" on May
10 and 11, and will remain at Buckingham
Palace for five days. The decision will give
an impetus to the season's festivities.

Central American Union.
PANAMA, April 11.—The Salvadoran
Congress has adopted a resolution that the
governments of Guatemala, Honduras,
Nicaragua, and Costa Rica be invited to
send five delegates to represent them in a
diet to meet in San Salvador the 1st of
September to determine the basis of the
proposed Central American union, select the
federal capital and take such other actions
as they may deem advisable to bring about
the end sought.

Vessels Lost at Sea.
London, April 11.—The French steamer
Amble has been lost at sea. Part of the
crew was saved and have landed at
Boulogne.

The British ship Viscount, Capt.
Courtney, which sailed from San Francisco
on Jan. 10 for Liverpool, was wrecked and
lost at Stanley, Falkland Islands, on March
21. Three of the crew, Sinclair, Lincoln
and Reid, were drowned. The remainder
landed at Stanley.

Epidemic of Incendiarism in Vienna.
VIENNA, April 11.—Since the fire in the
Ringstrasse Thursday night the firemen
have been kept busy responding to alarms
in various parts of the city, many fires being
discovered in their incipency and extin-
guished before any material damage was
done. All these fires are evidently of in-
cendiarist origin, and no doubt is enter-
tained that they were the work of
Anarchists or extreme Socialists. The
general feeling of uncertainty continues to
grow, and a great number of residents of
the city have provided private watchmen
to guard against attempts to fire it.

Miserable End of a Once Famous
Frenchman.

PARIS, April 11.—Gen. d'Audouart, once a
well-known figure of Paris, died in poverty
in Cayenne, in French Guiana, a few days
ago. The general was involved in the
scandal which brought about the disgrace
and fall of M. Wilson, now President
Grevy. He was condemned to five
years' imprisonment, to the loss of his title
as Senator, and to his rights as a citizen.
He had wandered about the world from
place to place since then until death over-
took him.

Financiers Who Will Have to Work.

LONDON, April 11.—The bond robbery
case, which has been before the courts for
a year, and which has excited much in-
terest in the stock brokerage and other
circles, was brought to an end today by
the conviction of the defendants, Walter
Selwyn, a stock broker, and Frederick
Peach, on the charge of conspiring to de-
fraud John Wilson Sears out of £380.
Selwyn was sentenced to five years' penal
servitude and Peach to fourteen months'
imprisonment at hard labor. The case arose
out of the robbery of a number of
Turkish bonds which were deposited with
Sears as security for a loan.

Gen. Booth's Matrimonial Bureau.

LONDON, April 11.—In an interview with
Mr. Cadman, director of Gen. Booth's
social redemption scheme of which, in
fact, it is said Cadman was the real originator,
it was explained that the matrimonial
bureau which the Salvation Army people
propose to establish will be mainly a com-
mercial venture. That is, it will not be
carried on free of charge, though there is
a philanthropic idea underlying the
scheme. It is intended to facilitate
suitable marriages among people who
have few opportunities for varied acquaint-
ance or social intercourse. Close inquiries
will be made in all cases, and negotiations
will be carried on only in behalf of persons
found worthy in all respects. The clients
of the bureau will be of all classes, rich and
poor will be treated alike, and no inquiry
will be made as to the creed of applicants.
The bureau will be set in operation as
readily for an atheist as for a follower of
the Salvation Army banner. Mr. Cadman
believes that the result will be to materi-
ally lessen the number of unsuitable
marriages.

Prefers Britain's Friendship.

BOMBAY, April 11.—The Gazette pub-
lishes a translation of a State paper that
the Amir of Afghanistan has issued to the
"noble chiefs of Afghanistan." The paper
recites the events that led to the Per-
dun incident and the Amir's reasons for
preferring British to Russian friendship.
The Amir says Russia only wants
Afghanistan as a high road to India, and
would place the Afghans in the van of her
army as a special target for Russian
cannons and rifles. The Russians would
strip the Afghans of their arms and of
food, and would outrage and murder their
women because they must destroy the
Afghans to obtain India. Therefore the

Amir declares that friendship between
Russia and Afghanistan is not to be
Shah Ali, who when Amir of Afghanistan
in 1878 became involved in a war with the
British, was according to the present
Amir a fool and making no being seen
was upon his people and ruin upon himself.

Ten Villages Burned.

VIENNA, April 11.—Ten villages in
Hungary have been burned. Large stores
of corn and many heads of cattle have been
burned. Five persons were killed and
thousands were homeless. A late dis-
patch from Loozden says that these
places have been almost totally destroyed by
fire. A courier was killed while trying
to rescue others. Several persons were in-
jured. A forest fire is raging at Loozden,
in Moravia. A fireman has been killed
while on duty.

Lively Scene in a London Court.

LONDON, April 11.—It is not a very in-
frequent occurrence in the London Police
Courts for interested persons to attempt
to assault the presiding magistrate. Mr.
Montague Williams, who sits in one of the
East End courts, often has been assailed
in this manner, and on one occasion he received
a severe blow in the face from such a person.
The habit seems to be spreading. Last night
the newspapers reported a case in which a
disappointed witness kicked in open court
his way out, for which he may have had
some excuse, and assailed the witnesses
for which there could be no punishment.
Saturday a scene even more lively was
acted at the Blackburn Quarter Sessions.
Pai Brady and Maggie Murphy, accused be-
fore the recorder of robbery, had much to say
to protest with emphasis against the
charge. Brady threw his belt at the pro-
secutor, attempted to jump out of the dock
with the accused intention of killing the re-
corder, and had to be held by seven police-
men while handcuffs were being put on him.
Maggie resisted these proceedings by
screaming and cursing loudly, and wound
up by throwing her wooden shoe at the un-
dressing reporters, crying, "That man,
you scoundrels, he has had to be hand-
cuffed, and it would have been worse
for the doctor of that court if he had
mouthed couple could have been gagged.
Both prisoners were sentenced to seven
years' penal servitude, and Brady was
sentenced to the chain gang rather
than imprudently.

The British Budget.

LONDON, April 11.—Sir John Lubbock,
J. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer,
presented the budget in the House of
Commons today. Mr. Goschen said good
fortune permitted him to again submit a
budget showing a surplus of £1,000,000.
This was largely due to the dropping of
parliament, for it was not until April 11
that an expansion of the revenue. There had
been times when he had suffered great
anxiety. During January and February
the prospect was not bright, but during
March it was better, and he had hoped to
submit a satisfactory result. In the
last budget the estimate of expenditure was
£290,264,000. The actual expenditure was
£285,628,000, leaving a surplus of £4,636,000.
The total estimate for 1891-92 was
£290,264,000. The actual expenditure for
the last three years was £274,000,000. The
total difference in the expenditures was
only £167,000. Analyzing the revenue,
Mr. Goschen said that the customs pro-
duced £19,730,000, being £200,000 more
than estimated. The increase in the duty
on the increase of the tax on beer, and

exceedingly satisfactory, yielding £10,000
over the estimate. Tobacco produced
£29,555,000, being £10,000 more than
previous year. All Mr. Goschen de-

Montana dispatches state that 500 de-
termined cowboys are trailing horse
thieves, and the prospects are that reports
of bloodshed will soon come. The number
of cattle the rustlers have stolen and de-
stroyed is most beyond estimate, and
their trailings of horses are estimated to
have reached 10,000 head.

100 negroes have been drowned by flood.

Not Dead Yet.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 11.—A certificate
of increase of the capital of the Standard
Oil Company of New York from \$5,000,000
to \$7,000,000 was filed with the Secretary
of State today. The certificate showed that
the amount of capital stock at present
actually paid in is \$5,000,000, and that the
increase of the company amount to
\$1,500,000.
