FAREWELL I

Rev. A. C. Courtice Bids Adieu to His Friends

And is Presented With a Purse of Gold-The Accompanying Address-Speeches by Pro! Bowman, John Cameron, Dr Arnott and Mrs. M. R. Thornley.

The General Conference has seen fit, to the regret of many of London's citizens, to remove Rev. A. C. Courtice, B.D., pastor of Dundas Center Methodist Church, from this city to Montreal. Since Mr. Courtice came to this city he has gradually won his way to the hearts of his own congregations, both by his methods of imparting spiritual knowledge and by his active interest in the temperance cause. Yesterday afternoon there was a gathering in the W. C. T. U. rooms to bid him farewell, Mayor Spencer being in the chair.

Mayor Spencer thanked the ladies and gentlemen for asking him to preside at the meeting. He thanked God for what the W. C. T. U. had done in this city during the last few years. He came to the meeting with feelings of sorrow and of gladness—sorrow because of the intended departure of one who had lead the union on in their good work, and glad because he had been so successful in that work. Mayor Spencer then called on Mr. D. A. McDermid, secretary of the London Temperance Association, to read the following address to Mr. Courtiee:

Dermid, secretary of the London Temperance Association, to read the following address to Mr. Courtice;
"Rev. A. C. Courtice, B. D., pastor Dundas Center Methodist Church, London, Ont. "Dear Sir—Your departure from the city at an early date furnishes us the occasion to publicly express our regret at the loss we are about to sustain and also to recognize the service you have rendered the cause of temperance during your three years' residence in London. We are well aware that this service has been rendered from the most disinterested motives, and without a thought of any other reward than the consciousness of having accomplished something for humanity and the moral and material well-being of the community.

"What has been called 'The Forward Temperance Movement' owes its inception, and a large share of its success, to your efforts. Temperance work in the city, up to the time of your coming among we had

and a large share of its success, to your efforts. Temperance work in the city, up to the time of your coming among us, had been largely educational (and too much cannot be said in honor of those who labored for years—often under most discouraging circumstances—in the sowing of the seed), but, commencing with the Joe Hess campaign, the work has gone on rapidly and without a single drawback, resulting in: 1. A more active enforcement of the provisions of the license laws. 2. A reduction in the number of places where liquors are sold from 69 to 40. 3. The election of a mayor and council favorable to the

The entire separation of liquors from gocery stores. 5. A reduction in a single year of the number of cases brought before the Police Court, attributable to strong drink, from 1,150 to 707, a decrease of 443. These are only the most direct results brought about. The indirect moral advantages will, we are persuaded, become more manifests as time goes on.

"In all this, as previously intimated, you have been a moving spirit. On the public platform and before the City Council and Board of License Commissioners your calm and judicious utterances have carried conviction, and challenged the respect of even those to whom you were opposed. In the meetings of committees, and on all other occasions where good sense and judgment were required, your counsel has been invaluable. We therefore ask your acceptance of this purse as expressing in a slight degree the esteem in which you are held by those who have been your coworkers, with the prayer that Almighty God may abundantly bless you and your family, and that wherever your future lot may be cast your labors in the cause of temperance and humanity may be as signally blessed as they have been in this place, and that you may have in the same degree the confidence and love of the active temperance workers.
