THE LATE SENATOR LEONARD. THE LATE SENATOR LEONARD.

The late Senator Leonard whose death was announced in yesterday's ADVERTISER, was born near Syracuse, New York State, on Sept. 10, 1814. He was thus in the 77th year of his age. While he was yet a young man, the family moved to Long Point, and four years later, in 1830, he came to St. Thomas, then a mere hamlet in the woods, where he commenced to manufacture engines and boilers in a small way.

later, in 1833, he came to St. Inomas, then a mere hamlet in the woods, where he commenced to manufacture engines and boilers in a small way.

His advent in London dates from 1838, when he removed to this city and built a foundry on Fullarton and Ridout streets, where he continued in an ever-growing business until fire destroyed the works in 1865. In 1853 he had erected a large building on York street, between Waterloo- and Colborne streets, which he used for carbuilding purposes in connection with his foundry, and when the latter was burned down, he converted these premises into a foundry and machine shop. In 1875 his two sons—Frank and Charles—were admitted into partnership. Their establishment was destroyed for the second time by fire in 1881, but undaunted by this the firm immediately rebuilt on the same site, and on a larger scale to meet their increased business. The firm of E. Leonard & Sons is one of the best known in the country, their trade extending throughout the Dominion. Employing as they do a large number of men—necessarily skilled mechanics—such an institution is invaluable to the city, an important factor in maintaining her commercial prestige, and a tribute to those under whose management it has so prospered. The late Senator Leonard was a successful manufacturer and a progressive citizen, and asked for no Government favors to assist him in conducting his business. It was his belief that with cheap raw material he could hold his own in the markets of this continent or any other. His sons have been trained up shrewd, keen business men like himself, and in his later years have taken entire charge of the business. Sam Small's Unique Lectures—Fall in Coal Prices.

Toronto, May 14.—"The Rich Man's Revenue and the Poor Man's Pay" was the subject of Sam Small's eloquent lecture last night in the auditorium, which he handled to the great delight of the large audience, who requested its repetition before Dr. Small leaves Toronto. The lecture showed that the revenue, which, he said, is the only excuse for the liquor traffic, comes from the consumers, not from the salconkeeper, and is a charge added to the drink. It is a bribe to the public on the plea of reducing taxes. The lecture was a clever presentation of the subject of license and revenue, and was frequently applauded.
