ONLY HALF A JOB.

What a Sub-Committee of the Board of Health Will Recommend Regard. -Citizens to Otherwise Dis-

-Cftizons to Otherwise Dispose of Their ashes.

The sub-committee of the Board of Health appointed to consider the matter of the collection of garbage in the city met the other day at Dr. Gardiner's office and decided to report in favor of dividing the city into four sections. They will also recommend the appointment of public scavengers to collect the garbage twice a week from May 15 to Nept. 15 and once a week during the remainder of the year. This will be done under the direction of the medical health officer. Ashes will not be collected. Vegetable and animal refuse are to be put in one box or other vessel, and such other matter as old boots, tin cans, etc., are to be kept in a separate receptacle. Both are to be put in a convenient place for the collector.

The four sections as mapped out by the committee are bounded as follows:

No. 1—Park avenue and Richmond, west side from Dundas to Grosvenor; Grosvenor, west to Taibot; Talbot south to Mill; Mill, to Dundas, bounded on the west by the river.

No. 2—Park avenue and Richmond, east

to Dundas, bounded on the west by the river.

No. 2—Park avenue and Richmond, east side, to Grosvenor; Grosvenor, east to Wellington; Wellington, south to St. James; St. James, east to Waterloo; Waterloo, south to Pall Mall; Pall Mall; east, both sides, to Adelaide, Adelaide, south to Elias; Elias, east, both sides, to English; English, south to Queen's avenue; Queen's avenue, east to Queen's east to Quebec; Quebec, south to Dundas; Dundas, west to Park avenue.

The meeting was called for the purpose of taking steps to secure a weekly sitting of a High Court judge in London, and also to advocate the establishing of a law school here. The committee reported that the petition had been signed by two-thirds of the profession in the nine western counties of Ontario, and that a communication had been received from the Carlton Law Association, Ottawa, disapproving of the decentralization of High Courts, but advocating decentralization by means of increased jurisdiction of county courts. The Oxford County Association, while approving of the principle, had declined to sign the petition.

On motion of Messus, Idington and Essery a committee was appointed to take further steps to secure the weekly sitting of a High Court judge in London. The motion caused a considerable breeze, it being at first severely attacked by numerous members.

Further action on the matter of establishing a law school was deferred.

Mr. Maybee suggested the formation of a Western Ontario bar association, and his proposition met with general approval.

It was stated incidentally that the Minister of Justice had been interviewed by M. Wilson, Q.C., of the Chatham bar, and had intimated that the Government would pay the traveling expenses of a High Court judge coming to London for the proposed weekly sittings.


