—The mother of Mr. A. A. McCrae, of Glenora, has undergone a very successful operation at the City Hospital.

—Miss Dollie Morrison, of Tilsonburg, has returned from a visit to her uncle, Mr. W. F. Merchant, principal of the Collegiate Institute.

—Mr. J. B. Aikenhead, of the Hobbs Hardware Company, has been spending a few days under the parental roof at Bruce, field.

—The Medicine Hat News, of May 30, speaks in flattering terms of Conductor Snyder's lecture. Conductor Snyder is a Londoner.

—Messrs. George Weynash and J. W. Fear, representing the forthcoming Dominion Day C. W. A. meet at Waterloo, Ont., were at the Tecumseh House on Saturday.

The four men are all known in Toronto, and have good records.

Yesterday was a regular field day for local corps of the Salvation Army. Major Jack Addie, in charge of an Illinois district, was with the soldiers, and held a series of meetings, including one in Victoria Park in the afternoon. The major is well-known in the city, and residents who recall the institution of the army here about fifteen years ago will remember "Happy Jack" as the leader. Major Addie was given a hearty welcome by the old soldiers and a hearty hand-shake by many a citizen. The evening meeting in the Citadel took the form of a farewell to two officers—Lieut. Captain Smetton and Cadet Thompson. The former has been connected with the London division for about six months, and has received instructions to go to Toronto, where he will succeed Major Streton as commander of finances at Provincial headquarters. Cadet Thompson has been posted here for two months. She will take a much-needed rest. On Wednesday and Thursday the ladies' band recently organized in this city will be at the Citadel. The band is ten strong, and has done some good work at western points. The members play brass instruments when on parade and string instruments in the meetings.

HIS NECK WAS BROKEN.
A very sudden death occurred in Delaware township on Friday afternoon. Wm. Adams, a carpenter residing on con. 3 of that township, was driving along the road near Atkins' blacksmith shop on the second concession and but a short distance from his home. He had a democrat wagon loaded with sheep and goods, and it appears that one of the sheep got under the seat in which he was seated, and caused its disengagement, throwing Mr. Adams and the sheep on the hard road. The unfortunate man alighted on his head, and when found shortly afterwards he was dead. His neck had been broken by the fall and death came instantly. Deceased was a brother of Mr. Samuel Adams, of the McCormick Manufacturing Company, and also of Mr. Adams, of the Gore of London. He was a member of the local children. The funeral took place from the late residence yesterday afternoon.

HENDERSHOTT AND WELTER.
The St. Thomas Journal says: "A gentleman who wrote to the Premier, Sir McKenzie Bowell, at the request of friends of Hendershott and Welter, pointing out that the prisoners had hitherto borne good characters, has received a reply in which the Premier says that the fact that their having been men of good character previously was so much against them. Had they been criminals before it might be said they had earned their committal by an act as that of which they have been found guilty. If good men previously it would be the harder to understand how they could commit it."

Mr. A. McCrimmon, solicitor for David Hendershott, of Walsingham Center, father of the murdered W. H. Hendershott, has entered an action against the Government Mutual Insurance Company, of Galesburg, Ill., to recover the insurance of \$5,000 on the deceased's life. He has been granted an order for the examination of John A. Hendershott, which will take place in the St. Thomas jail today.

THE ST. THOMAS MURDER CASE.
NO Action taken So Far by the Cabinet.

Ottawa, June 9.—The Hendershott-Walter capital case was not before the Cabinet yesterday afternoon, and consequently no decision has been reached. The case will not be considered by the Cabinet until this week.
