INTERNATIONAL CRICKET MATCH

Englishmen Win the Contest at Toronto.

Bean-Eaters Shut Out the Quaker City Ball Team.

Favorite Distanced at Lexington in the 2:10 Trot—Winding Up at Windsor—Curling, Fistic, and Other Sporting News.

CRICKET.

ENGLISHMEN WON.
Toronto, Oct. 14.—The Canadian eleven came very near making a technical draw of the match with the Englishmen at the Rosedale grounds yesterday. The Englishmen elected, shortly after play was resumed, to close their batting with only eight wickets down. The score was then: Canada, first inning, 87; England, first inning, 287. Canada went to bat in the second inning, and played excellent cricket. For the first wicket, that of Saunders, 18 runs were secured. Then McGivern and Logan got together, and by steady hitting put the score up to 62. Counsell joined Logan, with the result that the figures reached 127 for four wickets. Had this sort of thing lasted the Englishmen would have been played to a standstill, but the fast few wickets went down very quickly, and at 4:45 the inning ended with a score of 174. This made Canada's total for two innings 261, or just six less than required for a draw. The playing of Logan, Counsell and McGivern was quite up to the form of the Englishmen. Jesson, the best bowler in England, tried to break down the Canadian defense, but got only two wickets for 41 runs. Stoddard had better luck, securing three wickets for seven runs. The match was the best of the series played in America by the Englishmen. They remain here till Monday, when they go to New York and start for home. Prince Ranjitsinhji was not present, but may join the team here before Monday.

THE NORMAL SCHOOL

Work of Construction Progressing Satisfactorily—Nearing Completion.

Work on the Normal School is progressing rapidly. The brickwork is nearly complete, less than 50,000 bricks being required to finish it. The cut stone work will be through in ten days. The stone carving is progressing rapidly. The artist, Mr. Dodds, displays good taste in his work. Rafters and roofing are going on the west wing and central buildings. The east wing is well up towards the gables. The plaster, Martin & Bros. are now engaged constructing scaffolding in the assembly hall. The ceiling here is 31 feet high, and will be beautifully finished in staff. Burnett & Son, who have the sub-contract for the masonry, brickwork, etc., will be through in a week or ten days, and have given excellent satisfaction throughout. The galvanized iron work, which has been done by Stevely & Son, is well on. The main corridors are a very nice design, and reflect credit on the constructors. The work of extending the drain around the building may be put in at once, and the grounds will be graded and put in shape for opening at New Year's. The residents of South London are well pleased with the location and design of the building, and express themselves as more than satisfied with both. The contractor, Mr. John Purdon, has left no stone unturned to push this work through, and has given the utmost satisfaction. Mr. B. O'Byrne, inspector of the works, has an office on the grounds, and makes a close and thorough inspection of the work in the various branches.
