where the main body of the Boers with four guns held an excellent position on the edge of a deep donga, whence they shelled Gen. French.

The infantry attack was delivered at midday, when the Norfolks opened the fight by seizing the lower slopes of an ugly kopje. Steadily they worked their way to the crest of the hill, where a hot engagement ensued. The Lincolns shelled the hill on the right, protecting the Eighteenth Battery, which dragged its guns up the hill with the greatest difficulty and opened a heavy fire at close range.

Meanwhile the City Imperials, getting in touch with the Boers, the remainder of Tucker's division advanced across a semi-circular basin through which a railway ran. It was very open ground, and the Boers from the detached kopje and ridge delivered a heavy fire. In spite of this, however, the British moved on steadily, as if on parade. The advance was protected by guns, which vigorously shelled the Boer positions. About 4 o'clock the British advanced simultaneously, and occupied the Boer position, which was an excellent one, could be had at Brandfort, 15 miles distant across the open plain. The Boer loss is unknown.

WON THE VICTORIA CROSS.
London, April 2.—Trooper Morris, belonging to the Australian contingent on service in South Africa, has been recommended for the Victoria Cross for rescuing an officer while under fire. Morris is the first Australian to receive this coveted decoration, which carries with it an annual pension of £10 from the British Government. He will also receive £52 annually for life, this sum having been offered by an Australian insurance company to the first Australian winning the Victoria Cross.

BUGLE BLASTS.
The transport Norfolk sailed from Southampton yesterday for Cape Town, and had an enthusiastic send-off.

Army orders have been issued declaring the abolition of the title "Free State railways," and superseding this by the title "international military railways."

Dr. Leyds informs the Berlin press that 400,000 marks have been collected in Germany for the Boers.

HIS HEAD CUT OFF!

Terrible Accident to a Grand Trunk Brakemen in Sarnia Tunnel.

Port Huron, Mich., April 2.—Colin Cameron, a Grand Trunk brakeman, after coupling the engine of his train in the Sarnia tunnel yards last night, stepped on to the track alongside, and directly in front of an approaching train. He was instantly killed and badly mangled, the head being severed from the body, both legs and also one arm cut off.

The unfortunate man was from Alisa Craig, a widower, and leaves two small children.

MULTUM IN PARVO

Sir Louis Davies has received a cable from J. I. Tarte announcing his arrival in Paris.

Drake's basket factory at Alvinston and Auld's hotel at Sunbidge have been destroyed by fire.

Announcement is made in New York of the formation of the American sheet steel trust, capitalized at \$52,000,000.

The Cataract Power Company has reduced the rates for electric lighting of residences in Hamilton to one-half cent per hour.

Miss Elly Coghlan, sister of Rose Coghlan, the actress, and herself well known on the stage, was taken to the Bellevue Hospital today (Monday), apparently insane.

The Xs, in the Upper Yukon, shows indications of breaking up, making navigation possible this spring several weeks earlier than in any previous season within the memory of Alaska pioneers.

The census of Manila, just completed by the health department, gives the city an unpleasantly high rank among the unhealthful cities of the world. It establishes a death rate of something over 40 per cent at a conservative estimate.

Major Willard, United States engineer in charge of improvements for Chicago and vicinity, has made an estimate of the work involved in connection with the project to build a deep-water canal between the great lakes and the Atlantic. The cost would be about \$3,750,000.

Sir Charles Tupper, who visited Quebec on Saturday on political business, was tendered a dinner at the Garrison Club. He made a speech and mapped out the programme of the party, but the event was in no sense a public one. Gananoque high school has been damaged by fire.

The bureau of mines has been advised that the tale deposit recently discovered a mile from Madoc, Hastings county, is of splendid quality. Tale is a silicate of magnesia, the principal supplies of which have heretofore come from France. The deposit is to be worked on a large scale.

Papers have been filed at the Ontario parliament buildings showing that the taxable estate of the late Geo. E. Tuckett, of Hamilton, for succession dues is slightly over \$700,000. The taxation on this will be \$55,000, as most of the money is left to relatives, who come under the 5 per cent clause.

STRIKERS FIRM

Cleveland Machinists Will Not Resume Work Pending Arbitration.

Settlement Said to Have Been Reached in Chicago—A Strike of 150,000 Men Believed to Have Been Averted—Strikes in Hamilton.

Cleveland, April 2.—Contrary to expectation, the striking machinists here decided at a meeting on Saturday that they would not return to work pending arbitration. According to the statement given out, the proposed settlement by arbitration in Chicago will have no effect on the Cleveland situation. It is declared the strikers here will hold out until the nine-hour day is granted.

Chicago, March 31.—A settlement of the strike in the machine shops of Chicago was reached yesterday at a conference between officials of the unions and representatives of the employers. It is a settlement which is to be national in its scope, and under its terms the general strike timed to involve the 150,000 machinists of the country about April 1 will be averted.

The decision of workmen affected by the decision to resume work is estimated to be about 10,000. Of this total 5,000 are Chicagoans. From the terms of the settlement as drawn up and executed in writing, the strikers are figuring out a victory. This claim is not disputed to any extent by the manufacturers, who admit that concessions have been made. Although the final settlement is to be worked out by a board of arbitration, it is claimed that assurances have been made that they will guarantee the concession of the nine-hour day or its equivalent. President O'Connell will submit the issue of calling off the strike to a referendum vote at a mass meeting of the strikers this afternoon. The rank and file is said to be strongly in favor of the settlement. Much money has been lost on both sides by the strike.

Cleveland, April 2.—Carpenters' wages will be readjusted to \$2.25 a day, beginning today. The bosses have formed the Carpenter Contractors' Association, and none but union men will be employed.

Watertown, N. Y., April 2.—A strike was inaugurated at the works of the New York Air Brake Company this morning. Four hundred men are out. No trouble has occurred.

Hamilton, Ont., April 1.—Two hundred men, employed by the Hamilton Steel and Iron Works, went out on strike yesterday morning, causing the lay-off of 150 other workers and the closing down of the works. The strikers were employed as finishers in the nine and ten inch mills, and claim that under the western scale of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers of America, they were entitled to an advance of 4 per cent in their wages on March 1, and as this advance was not discernible in their last pay, although Manager Wilcox was aware it was due them, they refused to work longer until the increase was granted. The workers in the finishing department, number 150 and were compelled to quit work when the other men went out. Manager Wilcox refuses to make any statement. The men employed at the Hamilton Bridge Works are still out on strike.

Cleveland, Ohio, April 2.—Journeyman plumbers, to the number of about 200, went on strike in this city today for higher wages. The journeymen are at present receiving \$3 per day while junior plumbers get \$2.25. They demand \$3.50 and \$2.50 respectively, all men who have served five years or more to be entitled to the maximum pay.

GOOD BUSINESS

Being Done Throughout the Dominion—Bradstreet's Review.

Toronto, March 31.—Bradstreet's trade review weekly summary: Montreal—Trade received further stimulus the past week by additional advances in the price of staple goods. The advance will materially affect fall purchases, and in the mean time make the market very strong for current sales. Shipments continue on a large scale. The reports of trade in the country are encouraging. Country remittances very fair.

Hamilton—Business is of fair volume for the season, and the outlook promises a larger movement in staple goods than last year. Payments are fair.

Pacific Coast—Fair demand for staple goods. Business for March has not been as large as expected, but bank clearings show increase over last year.

Winnipeg—Business has been stimulated lately by spring-like weather. The outlook for the trade of the province and the coming season is very bright. Labor is well employed.

Lenders—London reports a favorable condition of trade. Poorer country roads may make business a little slow at some country centers, but the outlook for trade is very good. Payments are fair.

Toronto—There has been more activity in Toronto the past week. Shipments continue on a large scale. Values very fair for all classes of goods, and handsome profits will be made on many lines bought before the advances. In many cases it is now difficult to secure repeats at any price in time for the trade for the coming season.
