Merely Mentioned. Harry Cawthorne, an insurance agent, died in Montreal last night from the effects of a dose of poison. Deceased was 45 years of age and well known in insurance circles.

A small group of New York Jews has taken up the work of caring for Jewish refugees from Roumanian persecutions, and has thus far sent about 1,000 to places in the interior.

Waldorf Astor, the young son of William Waldorf Astor, who has only recently attained his majority, has been a week ago elected to the will of the original John Jacob Astor, which was made 50 years ago.

Berthubner, a Galt man, accused of stealing \$50 or \$60 from his landlady, at Galt, was arrested at Woodcock on Thursday by Constable Johnston, but he broke a board from the top of the door of his cell and escaped.

A new counterfeit \$10 silver certificate, series of 1891, with portrait of Hendricks, has been discovered. The counterfeit is described as a photographic print, without the silk fibers, and of inferior workmanship.

It has been decided to rebuild the House of Providence in Dundas, Ont., and to do it at once.

The United States has now sixteen torpedo boat destroyers, as well as sixteen torpedo boats in the last stages of their construction.

The population of Connecticut, as officially announced by the census bureau is 908,255, an increase of 182,997, or 21.7 per cent in ten years.

Deputy Minister Schreiber announces that the whole of the 14-foot waterway from Montreal to the west will be completed this fall. Only a little work at the west end of the Galops Canal remains unfinished.

DEADLY BLANK CARTRIDGE. Saginaw, Mich., Oct. 12.—Robert M. Mitts, aged 19, son of Sylvanus S. Mitts, a prominent citizen, died from lockjaw, he broke a blank cartridge. He became ill on Tuesday night, and grew steadily worse.

SHORTAGE, \$106,716. New York, Oct. 12.—The board of directors of the Elizabethport Banking Company held a meeting yesterday to take action on the defalcation of Wm. Schreiber, their missing clerk. The expert's accounting showed that the shortage was \$106,716. The bank will bring an action against "Mrs. Hart" for the recovery of the \$25,000 worth of jewelry, \$3,000 worth of horses and carriages, and several thousand dollars' worth of furniture, paintings and bric-a-brac now in her possession.

Germans Adopt Russian Ways

And Take Up Construction of a Chinese Railroad.

Sensational Stories From Shanghai—Talk of a Great Rising in the South—Army of 100,000 Men Wanted to Suppress the Manchus.

New York, Oct. 12.—The German Navy League has received a telegram from Tsing Tau, says a Berlin dispatch to the Herald, stating that the construction of the railway from Kiao Chao to Kaumi has been taken up again, under German military protection. General Yuan Shi Kai retired with his regular Chinese force to a distance of 50 kilometers from the railway when requested to do so by the German governor, Herr Jaeschke. The Germans occupied Kaumi. It seems that the Germans are now following the Russian method in Manchuria.

SHANGHAI SENSATIONS. London, Oct. 12.—A Shanghai dispatch of the 11th says: Sheng, the taotai, has received a telegram from Gen. Su, reporting that a serious rebellion, has broken out in the south-eastern part of Kwang Si Province; that his 30,000 troops are inadequate and that he needs at least 100,000 to cope with the danger, which is directed against the Manchus, and threatens to become worse than the Tai Ping rebellion.

FIVE MISSIONS DESTROYED. The Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Mail says that the rebellion in the Province of Kwang Tung is becoming anti-foreign and that five missions have been destroyed at Hian Kang Chau.

CRITICAL. Berlin, Oct. 11.—According to a dispatch received by the German Navy League, the situation in South China is exceedingly critical. The dispatch says that Chang Wei Hong, who advised the dowager empress to enroll the Boxers in the army, has been appointed governor of the new Chinese capital, Sian Fu. It is further asserted that many Chinese have been deported from Chin Kiang, Province of Kiang Su, and that Gen. Yuan Shi Kai has increased his army to 40,000.

Count Von Waldersee, an official telegram announces, will start for Peking Saturday. The Germans are awaiting reinforcements at Tien Tsin before undertaking further measures. They have effected telegraphic communication between Tien Tsin and Peking.

THE IMPERIAL PARTY. Shanghai, Oct. 11.—The Chinese report the arrival of the emperors and the empress at Chsu Ching, Oct. 6, 150 miles southwest of Yai Yuan Fu. After a day's rest, the Chinese add, the imperial party proceeded, escorted by large forces.

Berlin, Oct. 11.—The semi-official press asserts that there is no further doubt regarding the reported removal of the imperial court to Si Ngan Fu. The declaration is accompanied by a statement that Emperor Kwang Su's return to Peking is highly improbable, although his presence there is absolutely necessary to insure peace.

RUSSIAN MOVEMENTS. It is reported here that Russian troops from the southward occupied Mukden, Manchuria, without opposition, while the Russians from the north captured Tie Ling, 40 miles north of Mukden.

WILL STAY IN PEKIN. New York, Oct. 12.—It has been decided that a Methodist missionary force shall remain in Peking during the winter. This missionary property at the capital has all been destroyed, scarce one brick remaining on another.

INVALIDS ON THE MAINE. London, Oct. 12.—The American ladies' committee in London has received a cable dispatch from Wei Hai Wei, province of Shan Tung, China, dated Oct. 10, reporting the return there of the hospital ship Maine from Taku, with many invalids, of whom two officers and 69 men are Americans. Eighteen of the latter belong to the Ninth Infantry. The Maine will sail for Nagasaki today.

REPLIES TO THE FRENCH NOTE. Paris, Oct. 11.—Negotiations are proceeding actively on the subject of the propositions contained in the note of M. Delcasse, the French minister of foreign affairs, regarding China, and it is said here the situation is as follows: Russia, Italy and Austria accept it unconditionally. Germany has not yet communicated her reply officially, but the French Government has been given to understand that the French note affords a basis for negotiations. Great Britain also adhered to the French note, except respecting the permanent prohibition of the import of arms into China, on which point it makes certain reserves. The answer of the United States is not known. Japan has not replied officially, but is expected to acquiesce.

SATISFACTORY. The French note has resulted so satisfactorily that Mr. Delcasse has asked that the Peking ministers be authorized to confer with the view of opening preliminary negotiations with Li Hung Chang.

London, Oct. 11.—The officials of the foreign office say Lord Salisbury assents to M. Delcasse's Chinese note with a reservation, as to methods of prohibiting the import of arms, suggesting also that each nationally garrison one place instead of the proposed joint occupation of each locality.

THE CAMPAIGN. Great Rush to Hear Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Enthusiastic Reception Tendered Mr. Rowell in Little York—Notes by the Way.

THE RUSH TO HEAR LAURIER. Toronto, Oct. 12.—Yesterday was another busy day for the committee having charge of the arrangements for the reception of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues on Tuesday next. President Lindsey is being flooded with correspondence from the country, the burden of which was requests for accommodation for Liberals from a distance, who sought some assurance that they would not have a journey to Toronto in vain. They will receive tickets of admission, so that before starting they may be assured that they will have the pleasure of hearing the speaker. It is the intention of the committee to open several halls, so that there need be no lack of accommodation. As Sir Wilfrid will speak at each hall everyone will be able to hear him.

Persons residing in the city will have free access without tickets to the Massey Hall, or any of the other halls in which overflow meetings may be held.

GOOD WORDS FOR A GOOD MAN. Toronto, Oct. 12.—At an enthusiastic meeting in the Railroad Y. M. C. A. at Little York last night of the supporters of Mr. N. W. Rowell, at which many Conservatives also were present, Mr. Chester Massey paid a high tribute to the candidate as one eminently fitted for a place in the parliament of the country. He congratulated Mr. Rowell upon having so large and intelligent a representation of the electorate gathered to hear him. He himself was present because he believed Mr. Rowell would make a good member of parliament. He had known him for ten years as an honest and capable man, one in whom they could place unbounded confidence. They wanted such a man to represent them. In voting for a man for a public office their first thought should be, "Is he a fit and proper person?" He impressed upon his hearers the importance attaching to choosing a man to help make the laws of the country. They could not afford to send a man, he said, who was not moved by right motives, but they could not make a mistake by marking their ballots for Mr. Rowell.

Mr. Massey's sentiments met with vociferous approval.

TORONTO NOMINEES. Toronto, Oct. 11.—The first of the regular party nominations for city constituencies was made last night, when the Liberals of West Toronto put Ald. Burns and Mr. J. D. Allan into the field.

E. F. Clarke, M.P., and E. B. Osler, M. P., the sitting members, will probably be renominated at the Conservative convention Saturday.

John Flett, a well-known wholesale merchant, consented to become the Liberal candidate in Center Toronto.

NOTES. Mr. S. F. McKinnon, a prominent merchant and manufacturer, agreed to accept the Liberal nomination for Halton county.
