Germans Adopt Russian Ways

And Take Up Construction of a Chinese Railroad.

Sensational Stories From Shanghai-Talk of a Great Rising in the South-Army of 100,000 Men Wanted to Suppress the Manchus.

Navy League has received a telegram from Tsing Tau, says a Berlin dispatch to the Herald, stating that the construction of the rallway from Kiao joint occupation of each locality. Chao to Kaumi has been taken up again, under German military protection. General Yuan Shi Kai retired with his regular Chinese force to a distance of 50 kilometers from the railway when requested to do so by the German governor, Herr Jaeschka. The Germans occupied Kaumi. It seems that the Germans are now following the Russian method in Manchuria.

SHANGHAI SENSATIONS. London, Oct. 12. - A Shanghai dispatch of the 11th says: Sheng, the taotai, has received a telegram from Gen. Su, reporting that a serious rebellion, has broken out in the southeastern part of Kwang Si Province: that his 30,000 troops are inadequate and that he needs at least 100,000 to cope with the danger, which is directed against the Manchus, and threatens become worse than the Tai Ping rebellion.

It is further as-serted that many Chinese have been decapitated at Chin Kiang, Province of Kiang Su, and that Gen. Yuan Shi Kai has increased his army to 40,000. Count Von Waldersee, an official telegram announces, will start for Pekin next Saturday. The Germans are awaiting reinforcements at Tien Tsin before undertaking further measures. They have effected telegraphic communication between Tien Tsin and

How Times Have Improved in London Manufactories

During the Past Four Years-Some Instances Given-There Are Others.

In common with the other cities of the Dominion, London has prospered greatly under the general tariff. and stability of the Laurier Government, Its industries have thrived and manufacturers generally have had five years of increased volumes of trade. It has been found necessary in the majority, of cases to increase largely the number of employes. For instance, the McClary Manufacturing Company, who employ more hands than any other concern in the city, have more than 600 names on their pay roll now, and in 1895, the last year the Conservatives were in power, they had only 450. A corresponding increase has been made in all of their branch factories. The number of employes at D. S. Perrin's manufactory has increased from 150 to 255, and
