#### A YEAR'S FAILURES IN THE DOMINION

Bradstreet's Report Indicates an Increase-Ontario's Record Shows Fewer Embarrassments.

The record of failures in Canada for the past year, as reported by the Bradstreet's Company, show that more business firms went under in 1901 than in the preceding year, and liabilities also increased. There were 37 more failures all over the Dominion last year than in 1900, assets were \$952,019 more, and liabilities, as was to be expected, increased

Ontario's record, however, is rather more favorable in one respect, failures in this province having failen off by 27, although the liabilities increased by nearly a million dollars. Quebec makes the most favorable showing, failures being 30 less, while liabilities decreased \$1,919,435. In New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and the Northwest Territories a larger number of failures are noted. of failures are noted

John J. Mason, the contractor, stated that the well was liable to burn for two or three weeks unless some scheme can be devised to check the flow of gas. It comes from the solid rock, in his opinion, and this makes the work more dangerous, as there is not much hope of the well burning out. In the meantime a force of firemen are kept busy pouring water on the smoking mill of the lumber com-pany, and a bucket b. igade is doing service for the buildings

If the wind shifts to the south, nothing can save the mill plant. The gravest fears are entertained. Mr. Mason stated that the machinery in the well was worth \$40,000, and it is expected that the machinery in the tool house will suffer, as the heat is so intense that workmen cannot get it out. This is the first gas well that has struck in Sarnia for many a

\$8,000 Worth of Diamonds.
