MAJORITY WAS NARROW

French Government Barely Supported on Military Question.

Paris, Oct. 29. — After an exceed-ingly stormy debate in the Chamber of Deputies, the Government last night escaped defeat by four votes only, and rumors are already current that Gen. Andre, the Minister of War, whose administration was the subject of the discussion, contemplates resignation. For some time Gen. Andre has been the object of violent attacks in the press, not wholly confined to opposition papers, the principal charges against him being favoring officers whose policies coincide with the Government's stopping the promotion of those suspected of clerical or conserv ative tendencies, organizing an elabcrate system of spying upon the private lives of officers, and encouraging officers to act as informers. These charges were made the subject of an interpellation by Lieut.-Col. Rousset, who went into great detail, reading correspondence alleged to have passed between a confidential subordinate of the minister and the heads of the Masonic lodges on the subject of the promotion or disgrace of various offi-


