JUDGE MEREDITH IS CHAIRMAN

Col. J. W. Little Is Vice-Chairman—Meeting of University Board of Governors.

The organization meeting of the board of governors of the Western University was held last evening in the city hall with Mayor Stevely presiding.

Mr. Justice R. M. Meredith was unanimously elected chairman of the board, and Col. J. W. Little was chosen vice-chairman.

Dr. C. N. James, provost of the university, was named as principal. The estimates for the year were presented by Principal James.

Mr. T. H. Smallman thought that each member of the board should be furnished with a copy of the estimates.

"I think we should be given the fullest possible information on the subject," said Mr. Smallman. "The majority of us, at least, are unfamiliar with the work, and we need every assistance. We should be given all particulars regarding salaries, vacancies, and all matters pertaining to the university."

Principal James will furnish the desired information at the earliest possible moment.

Committees Named.

Several committees were appointed to deal with matters pertaining to the university.

Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. C., Mr. T. H. Smallman, Ald. J. H. A. Beattie and Mr. C. R. Somerville were selected as a committee to confer with the governing body of Huron College regarding rental of the grounds and buildings.

Col. J. W. Little, Capt. T. J. Murphy and Dr. John D. Wilson were appointed to confer with the city council to complete arrangements for the transfer of the \$5,000 grant set aside for the purposes of the university.

A committee to be composed of Principal James, Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. C., Capt. T. J. Murphy, Ald. J. H. A. Beattie, and Mr. J. O. Dromgole were appointed to draw a set of by-laws to govern the actions of the board. It was thought that such by-laws were necessary to properly govern the sessions of the board.

Filling Vacancies.

The appointment of a successor to Prof. Alexander, classical master, was also discussed. It was decided to allow Principal James to make further inquiries as to applicants for the place. That the very best man available should be selected was the opinion of the board. Recommendations to the board will be made very shortly, and the other part of the board will be completed at the beginning of the term.

City Clerk Baker was asked to act as secretary of the board until such time as a permanent secretary is appointed.

The next meeting will be held on Saturday, Sept. 26, at 2 o'clock. Those present were Mr. Justice R. M. Meredith, Mayor Stevely, Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. C., Capt. T. J. Murphy, Mr. R. C. Struthers, Mr. T. H. Smallman, Mr. J. O. Dromgole, Mr. J. H. Chapman, Mr. C. R. Somerville, Dr. John D. Wilson, Ald. J. H. A. Beattie, Professor James and City Clerk Baker.

Well-Known Resident of Dorchester Passes Away.

Mr. James Judge, aged 63 years, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia on Wednesday, the 16th inst., at the home of his son, Robert Judge, Dorchester, after an illness of ten days. Interment took place on Friday from the residence of his son Robert to the Union Cemetery, Dorchester, and the funeral was largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. H. The chief mourners were Mrs. Judge, William, John, James and Robert Judge, sons, all of Dorchester; Mrs. Spring, Mrs. Patterson and Miss Annie Judge, daughters, of Dorchester; and the brothers, William Judge, West Nissouri; David, of Sarnia, and Robert, Port Huron; also the sisters, Mrs. Alcock, Sarnia; Mrs. Jones, Port Huron, and Mrs. Cook, Windsor.

The pallbearers were William Aylsworth, James McVeen, Angus McVeen, James Strathdee, Edward Spring and William Hartie.

Erskine, the rider of Uncle Ned, who won the race, laid back until almost the last turn, when he whipped up, and came home under the bit.
