The scarlet fever seems to be scattered throughout the city, as patients have come in from all quarters.

The Hardware Convention.

There was a meeting of the finance and executive committees in connection with the convention of the Ontario hardware and stove dealers, who will meet in this city in February next, with Col. Gartschke in the chair. It was the duty of the city for the use of the arcade during the meeting of the convention. If this request is granted the place will be used for an exhibit of hardware and metal goods "made in London." Exhibitors in this section, it was thought, would gladly pay \$1 a foot frontage for the privilege of exhibiting, which would aid in meeting the expenses of the convention. The matter of financing the entertainment of delegates also came in for a good deal of discussion. A list of local firms interested in the event was finally made, and there was asked to contribute toward the entertainment fund. Mr. A. M. Hunt was appointed treasurer.

CITY DEMANDS THE STOPOVER

Water Commissioners Lay Down Terms for the London Street Railway.

AN ANSWER BY FRIDAY

Company Will Consider the Request for Ten-Cent Fare With a Stop-Over at the Pumphouse.

The London street railway have until Friday morning to say whether or not they will agree to a ten-cent return fare to Springbank, with stopover privileges at the pump house.

Yesterday afternoon the question was gone into again, but the matter was left in the situation described above.

When the discussion opened Manager King stated that a ten-cent fare was the best the company would do.

"We will insist upon a ten-cent fare and the stopover privileges," declared Chairman Jones.

A ten-cent fare is as far as we will go," said Manager King. "I object to going into any agreement."

"It's a very small thing," said Mayor Stevely. "The company will not lose anything by it."

"I do not know whether or not we will lose anything," said Manager King.

The Amusements.

The question of amusements was taken up in the interim, and Chairman Jones insisted that he did not want to make a Coney Island out of Springbank, but a quiet spot for the women and children.

"I suppose a substantial bond will have to be put up by those desiring amusement privileges," asked Mr. Ivey, solicitor for the company.

Commissioner Darch pointed out that this had been decided upon at a previous meeting.

"Of course, if a person comes along and puts a guarantee to build a certain amusement device, the company will be given thirty days to accept or reject it," said Commissioner Darch. "We will have to demand a bond in return from the company that they will build the device within the period mentioned by the first bidder. That I think is fair, and we should be protected."

"We will agree to that," said Mr. Ivey. "We will put up a bond equal to any other company asking privileges."

The Fares Again.

The question of fares was reverted to, and Chairman Jones insisted on stopover privileges. Mr. King would not agree.

"Well, negotiations are off so far as I am concerned," said the chairman. "I am tired trying to do business with the company. It is a small thing, and if the company are going to stick over such a trivial matter we had better call everything off."

Mr. C. H. Ivey smoothed the trouble out, and said that it was probable that the board of directors of the road would hold a meeting within a day or two, and it would be accepted.

"We will have the official sanction I think in a few days," said Mr. Ivey. "We will either accept it or reject it by Friday morning."

The time was satisfactory to all parties.

Competition Again.

Mr. W. C. Fitzgerald made a claim for the amusement privileges. He pointed out that he was ready to put up a substantial bond that the device would be put in. He pointed out that they would give employment to many men, and use power from the city.

Commissioner Darch wanted a clause inserted in the company's agreement to the effect that if more power was used than they could develop, it should be purchased from the city, not a rival concern. However, this was not agreed to.

Sign It Now.

Chairman Jones insisted that the company sign the agreement at once. "Sign it now, or it's all off," he insisted.

However he agreed to accept the compromise, and on Friday an answer will be given.

Mr. Fitzgerald asked the commissioners to see to it that his company were given a chance for the privileges. "Do not make it impossible for us to get on it," he pointed out.

On Friday noon a meeting will be held to settle the question.

Those present were Chairman W. Jones, Mayor Stevely, Commissioner Darch, Engineer Darch, Secretary Ellwood, Manager King, Mr. C. H. Ivey, and Mr. W. C. Fitzgerald.

CITY AND COMPANY

COME TO TERMS

Street Lighting Matter Has Been Settled for Another Spell.

GARBAGE BYLAW AGAIN

City Council Last Night Sent Matter Back to the City Solicitor for Another Opinion.

At a special meeting of the council last evening an agreement with the London Electric for street lighting was arrived at.

The company, through Mayor Stevely, proposed that they light the streets as usual on the sliding scale, providing a clause is put in the new lease to the effect that the present contract does not prejudice either the rights of the company or of the city.

"I saw the proposed agreement, as drawn up by Mr. Judd, solicitor of the company, and I think it will be satisfactory," said Ald. Beattie. "It practically means that the old agreement is in force, with a sliding scale of prices if the contract does not run a year, and with a clause to the effect that the new agreement will not prejudice their rights under the old agreement, or our rights."

Mayor Stevely stated that the contract was now in the hands of the city solicitor, and would be ready for the special meeting Wednesday noon, when it would be considered.

The Garbage Bylaw.

The letter of City Solicitor Meredith calling the council's attention to the fact that the debentures for the proposed garbage bylaw were redeemable in ten years, not thirty years.

Ald. Cooper thought it better to rescind the motion to send the bylaw to the people, and moved to that effect.

Ald. Gerry seconded.

Ald. Ferguson and Ald. Stevenson did not think it wise to refuse the citizens the right to vote on the question, and consequently Ald. Stevenson moved that the opinion of the city solicitor be asked whether it would be better to submit the bylaw on a ten-year basis, and obtain the consent of the Legislature to retire the debentures in thirty years, or submit it on a thirty-year basis and petition the Legislature to validate it.

"I do not think that will do any good," said Ald. Gerry.

However, Ald. Stevenson's motion passed, and Mr. Meredith's opinion will be ready for Wednesday noon.

COLLEGIATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Conditions Governing Those To Be Given by Mr. J. I. Carter, of Sarnia.

The conditions governing the scholarships to be given annually by Mr. J. I. Carter, of Sarnia, Ont., for competition by the pupils of the collegiate institutions and high schools of the county of Middlesex are as follows:

The candidate who obtains the highest aggregate marks on upper school papers (for entries into faculty of education, or honor and scholarship matriculation in arts), shall be awarded the first scholarship of \$100; the candidate who obtains the second highest aggregate shall be awarded the second scholarship of \$80; the candidate who obtains the third highest aggregate shall be awarded the third scholarship of \$60; the candidate who obtains the fourth highest aggregate shall be awarded the fourth scholarship of \$40, and the candidate who obtains the fifth highest aggregate shall be awarded the fifth scholarship of \$20.

No pupil shall be eligible to write on any of these scholarships who has not attended one of the collegiate institutions of high schools in the county for at least one year previous to the examination, and no pupil who has been awarded one of these scholarships shall be eligible to compete at any subsequent examination.

The Minister of Education, having consented to certify to the relative standing of the students entitled to these scholarships (at the July departmental and university examinations), the awards will be made on the certificate shall be final and conclusive.
