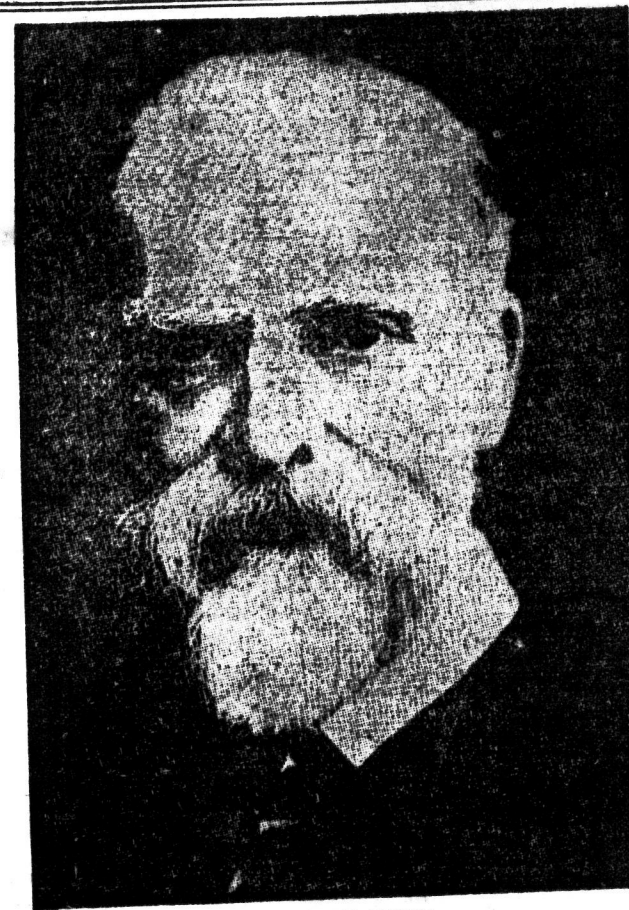
Mr. Wm. J. Power, of Duluth,

**DEALERS MUST KEEP A RECORD
OF DANGEROUS WEAPONS SOLD**

New Law Went Into Effect Today Owing to the Many Shootings
and Stabbings Which Have Occurred in Ontario.

Local police officers and dealers in weapons are most favorably inclined toward the new law, which went into effect today, and states that every person who purchases for sale or sells any bowie-knife, dirk, dagger, stiletto, metal knuckles, skull-crackers or slung-shot, or who sells a revolver, pistol or any person other than the holder of a certificate from the provincial or other police stating that the thing is liable to a fine of from \$20 to \$200. The purchaser is equally liable under the act.

REVEALED AT TRIAL**

Mr. Edmund Meredith Speaks of
the Murder of Wife by the
Prisoner Deline.

"IN DARKEST CANADA"

Terrible Crimes Go On From Year to
Year, and It Is Found Impossible
to Remedy the State of
Affairs.

Mr. Edmund Meredith, K. C., crown prosecutor at the Peterboro assizes, where the prisoner Deline, charged with murdering his young wife, pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter, and was sentenced to life imprisonment, arrived home this morning. Mr. Meredith, when seen by The Advertiser, stated that in the Township of Belmont, where Deline lived, morals are at a very low ebb. The evidence was for the most part absolutely revolting. That such a condition of affairs could exist in Canada is a disgrace to civilization, and in Mr. Meredith's opinion, leaves room for much work to be done at home by those who are endowed with the missionary zeal. The land of the district where the crime was committed, is perhaps the poorest in the Dominion. Poverty has brought the people down to a deplorable level, and the lowest crimes known to the criminal calendar are part and parcel of the lives of the people.

Reciprocity Bill Passed
Today.

SITUATION COMPLICATED

Many of the Amendments Not Legal
and Will Be Thrown Out.

Washington, April 21.—The House of Representatives entered today upon what the leaders hope is the final stage of the Canadian reciprocity bill. Chairman Underwood of the committee on ways and means is exerting all possible pressure to compel action. It was agreed at a conference between Mr. Underwood and Representatives McCall of Massachusetts, and Dailzell of Pennsylvania, that general debate would close at 3 p.m., and in order. Today's debate included speeches by Mr. McCall and Mr. Dailzell, the former in advocacy of the measure, and the latter against it. Mr. Underwood, as majority leader, claimed the privilege of closing the debate. The situation is complicated by the great number of amendments offered. Many of these are not legal, and will be thrown out. The remainder, many of which have been offered to delay action, will provide difficulties for their sponsors, are prepared to demand roll call. For these reasons doubt is expressed by leaders that a vote can be reached without continuing the session into the night. Others believe Mr. Underwood will resort to "steam-roller" methods and force action. The Democratic "steam roller" has proved itself effective this session, and the optimists of the party are planning their faith to it on this occasion.
