

LAYS MURDER TO HIS COUSIN

Is Accused of Killing His Beautiful Young Bride.

THE WOMAN IN AFFAIR

Her Revelations Contradict the Statements of the Husband.

Richmond, Va., July 22.—Coroner Lovine's jury rendered this verdict in the Beattie murder case this afternoon:

"That Louise Owen Beattie came to her death as the result of a gunshot wound from a gun in the hands of her husband, Henry Clay Beattie."

Jury Agrees Quickly.

The jury met at noon at the Lovine home in Chesterfield County, and resumed the investigation of the death of Mrs. Beattie, who was killed last Tuesday night on the Midway turnpike while motoring with her husband. Several witnesses were examined, among them Paul Douglas Beattie, cousin of the accused man, who made oath that he purchased a gun for Henry Clay Beattie last Saturday. The jury was out but 10 minutes when it came to an unanimous agreement.

H. M. Smith, the attorney for the defendant, indicated in his cross-examination of Paul Beattie this afternoon that an effort will be made to prove that Paul, and not Henry Beattie, used the gun on the night of the murder. Paul Beattie was asked if he had not charged Henry Beattie a week before with dealing unfairly with him and his brother in the settlement of Paul Beattie's father's estate, if he had not become alarmed when he realized that the gun would be turned to him and tried to put the crime on his cousin, and if he had not made the confession of the purchase of the gun to save himself.

Paul Beattie becomes faint. He said that he and his cousin had always been on good terms despite the fact that Henry Beattie rarely visited his home.

The moment Paul Beattie closed his statement he became faint and was escorted to the hospital. He was treated for several minutes and then returned to the porch, where the inquest was held, and resumed his testimony. Although very weak and extremely nervous, the young man did not change his original story during the vigorous examination of Henry Beattie's attorney.

As the jury went to a room to deliberate on the verdict a crowd of several hundred persons, held in restraint by ropes which were stretched a certain distance from the house, broke through the ropes. When Mr. Lovine appeared a few minutes later and announced that the jury had voted unanimously to charge the husband of the slain woman with the crime the crowd dispersed quietly.

Henry Beattie is calm. Henry Clay Beattie, without any sign of emotion, heard the jury's charge. Before the last verdict was pronounced when Mr. Beattie was lighting another cigarette, having kept one in his mouth continuously throughout the hearing.

Undoubtedly he was the most self-possessed person in the circle on the porch where the evidence was heard. His composure was the feature of the examination and caused considerable comment. The excitement of the past several days has subsided, and there is no danger of mob violence. Henry Clay Beattie was remanded to the city jail in Richmond to await trial and Paul Beattie and Miss Beattie Winford are held in jail as witnesses.

The return of the beautiful Beulah Winford, a blonde of 19 years, to the city is given as the motive for the crime. Young Beattie was known as a sport and spendthrift, and it was common talk that he preferred the Beulah woman to his quiet, modest little wife. At least this is the way the police and detectives sum up the case.

Beulah Woman Tells Story. In her testimony before the coroner's jury Beulah Winford, the "other woman in the case," contradicted Beattie in many particulars. She stated that she had been with Beattie for several weeks, and laid bare the details of her relations with the accused husband. She said she had been with Beattie the night before the murder, and was with him until midnight. She had met him four times in two weeks at resorts, and had been with him at the Norfolk Hotel for four years ago, when she was only 13 years old, and of his sending her to St. Mary's Academy in Alexandria. After being at school one month, she continued, she "got lonesome" and returned home. She told of the birth of a child, Ralph, N. C., in 1909. The baby, which had been put in the care of a Richmond family, died here the following year, and the girl said she understood Beattie paid funeral expenses. She declared that her relations with Beattie were broken off entirely before his marriage, but that she met and followed him to Richmond in spite of his protests. Since her arrival he had seen her frequently, she said, and had given her money with which to buy furniture for a home.

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LORDS READY TO DRINK THE HEMLOCK

"Last Ditchers" Will Probably Give in at Last Moment.

MONDAY DECIDES ISSUE

Editor Garvin Says Surrender Will Split the Unionist Party.

London, July 23.—Premier Asquith's letter to Mr. Balfour, the leader of the Unionists, stating that he had the King's guarantee and intended to use them if necessary, came with dramatic suddenness to everyone. It may be strongly suspected, and to Mr. Balfour himself, and Lord Lansdowne, the leader of the Opposition in the second chamber. Such letters are not given unless the intention has been given that they would be useful or welcome. They were both to Lord Lansdowne and Mr. Balfour, while Premier Asquith had his own good reason for acquiescing in the intimation.

During the past week there has been a marked increase of the number of the "last ditchers" who are ready to give in at last moment. Monday, Mr. Balfour and Lord Lansdowne, with the full knowledge that the bill would be passed on Tuesday or the other, were convinced that bowing to the inevitable was the better policy. They had been badly harassed by the recalcitrance of Mr. Asquith's letter furnished them with a power of the argument. It put the peers definitely in possession of all the facts and, in effect, placed upon them the means of saying whether their ardor should be flooded by the introduction of a party of "last ditchers," or whether they would be obliged, if he wished, to maintain in office, to use his power "to the limit." Nevertheless he is most anxious to avoid being forced to create peers in wholesale fashion, as a matter of fact such a step would be obnoxious to practically the whole of the Liberal party, especially the Liberal peers.

It goes without saying that the Premier's letter would not have been written without the knowledge of the King, and it may be taken as indicating his earnest desire that a "social shock" as Lord Morley called it on Thursday, should, if possible, be avoided.

Although the letter had the immediate effect of weakening the "last ditchers," there is still believed to be a possibility of things being done tomorrow. The "fight to a finish" party still urge the peers not to yield, declaring that the whole of the Liberal party would be ruined by the creation of peers would ruin the Government, even hoping, perhaps, that the Government would shrink from the reform of the last moment, and if fifty or sixty stalwarts could be steered into the Opposition lobby the situation would be dangerous, as the Liberal party would be unable to vote. They could hardly go into the lobby and support the Government's bill of none too willing peers, but it will probably be found by Monday that Lord Lansdowne has not his house in order ready to drink the hemlock.

In the meantime interest centres in the meeting of the House of Commons tomorrow when Mr. Asquith is expected to make a more explicit statement of his programme than he has done up to the present. The pressure on the Government to this hour is enormous. It is possible that the Government may move the postponement of the consideration of the Lords' amendments for a few days to enable it to find out what the Upper House will do. If the result of the negotiations is not satisfactory the Government may announce the creation of a batch of fifty new peers as an object lesson to the Lords. The Liberal party are anxious to see the Liberal party who aspire to coronets and see their chances rising and falling with the fluctuations in the peerage market.

A correspondent of the Times, who signs "Anti-Corruption," declares it is an open secret that a peer who has created contributes a certain amount to the party funds. He points out that 100 new peers would give the Liberal organization a large fund to play with, which could be used to subsidize candidates and buy local papers. Sir Edward Henry Carson, M.P. for Dublin, chairman of the Irish Unionists, has issued a statement and has informed Lord Lansdowne that if we have home rule forced upon us without an appeal to the country it will be as easy to resist it next year as it is now. He also protests against the calamity of a surrender. J. L. Garvin, editor of the Sunday Observer, in appealing for a large attendance at the banquet to be given on Wednesday next in honor of the Earl of Halsbury, says that "no surrender" represents the conviction of the majority of the Unionist party and the majority of its leaders. In the event of surrender, he says, the party will split from top to bottom, and will never be reconstructed under the present leadership. It is a grave thing, adds Mr. Garvin, that the party is still ignorant of Mr. Balfour's real mind.

ASIATIC CHOLERA REACHES BOSTON

Boston, July 23.—Asiatic cholera has reached Boston and caused one death while two foreign sailors who are believed to have brought the dread disease here, after being taken ill, disappeared, and their whereabouts are unknown, according to a statement given out officially today by Chairman Samuel H. Durgin, of the Boston Board of Health. The cholera victim was Mrs. Tassolino Mastrodonato, who died in the detention hospital on Gallipoli Island Thursday. Mrs. Mastrodonato took into her home as lodgers a few weeks ago two sailors who were members of the crew of a steamer supposed to have sailed from an Italian port. The sailors subsequently were taken ill and disappeared. Efforts are being made to locate them.

DEATH OF A PILGRIM. Quebec, July 23.—Mary Sullivan, aged twenty-two, of Kingston, Ont., died suddenly yesterday at Ste. Anne de Beaupre while on a pilgrimage there. Her sister accompanied her on the pilgrimage and has taken the remains home.

WESTERN CITIES ASK TO LIFT COAL DUTY

Fear a Fuel Famine Next Winter as Result of Strike.

Ottawa, July 23.—The mayor of Calgary, with the mayors of some other western cities, are in Ottawa. They will tomorrow wait upon the Government and ask that the duty on bituminous coal be removed. They declare that this is necessary in view of the difference between the western coal miners and the mine-owners, which has resulted in the mines being closed for several months. They state that there is no prospect of a settlement, and that if an opportunity is not afforded to bring in American coal there will be a fuel famine in the west this winter.

Minister of Labor King has telegraphed the executive of the United Mine Workers at Calgary, and the vice-president of the Calgary Board of Trade, noting the fact that it has been declared on behalf of the miners that the question of wages alone was the reason of the strike, and that the question of an open or closed shop had nothing to do with it. He says that the meeting of the miners and the mine-owners in Macleod on Monday the accuracy of this opinion should be established, and adds that if the question of wages constitutes the only difference it should not be difficult to reach a settlement, which would result in the working of the mines being resumed.
