

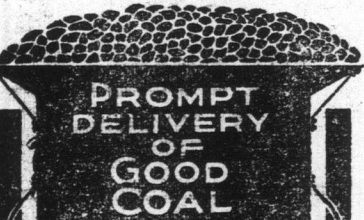

GOVERNMENT MAY ORDER SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM

Sarnia Is in the Same Predicament as Windsor and Provincial Health Officer Writes Council Regarding Pollution of the River—Council to Take Matter Up.

Sarnia, Aug. 17.—Windsor is worrying over a communication received from Dr. McCullough, chief officer of the provincial board of health, in which he calls attention to the new health act, prohibiting the dumping of obnoxious sewage into rivers, lakes, etc. Windsor, however, is not the only municipality to get one of these enlightening little notices, for Sarnia is also on the list, a similar epistle having been received and filed here at the last council meeting.

The aldermen apparently are not worrying over the matter, nor as far as can be learned, has the question been brought up for consideration.

The predicament of the down-river city, however, has caused some uneasiness here, and it may be that Sarnia, too, will have to prepare for a sewage disposal system. Just how the sewage system here would be affected in such a case is not known. The question will doubtless be brought up at a future council meeting.

BUSINESSMEN MAY EXTEND ESPLANADE

Think It Would Add Greatly to General Attractiveness.

WANT WATERWORKS TO BE COMMENCED SOON

Board of Trade Urges Council to Do Something in Important Matter.

Sarnia, Aug. 16.—Several municipal questions were brought up and discussed at the Sarnia Board of Trade meeting last night. One of the most important features of the meeting was a resolution passed urging the town council to take definite and prompt action in the establishment of the new waterworks.

The councillors, in the opinion of most citizens, have dilly-dallied with this matter too long, and the action taken last night may have some salutary effect.

Another resolution was passed asking the council to give the communication of the board of underwriters in regard to more adequate fire protection, more prompt consideration than has been customary in the past. It is recognized that the town has made several improvements along this line, so that everything cannot be remedied at once, but it is believed that there are many minor details which can be attended to.

VOLLEY OF BIRDSHOT FOR "FRESH" HARVESTERS

Unpleasant Reception for Excursionists Who Attempt to Raid the Gardens.

North Bay, Ont., Aug. 16.—A crowd of New Brunswick harvest hands bound for the western wheat fields on the C. P. R. excursion met with an unpleasant reception at Coldwell, 456 miles west of North Bay, which checked their exuberance. When the special train stopped at Coldwell, a gang of young men proceeded to raid the farmers' gardens nearby, but when gleefully gathering up their spoils were stung into realization of their crime by a broadside of birdshot from the shotguns of farmers in ambush. About a dozen of the harvesters were wounded painfully, but no serious injuries resulted. It has been impossible to discover who was responsible for the shooting, but the farmers near the C. P. R. station are ready this year for any acts of the lawless band which annually curses the country, leaving various marks of its passing.

TOURING BUSINESSMEN SEE GOLD "CLEAN-UP"

Witness Pouring of \$18,000 in Molten Gold into a Mould.

Schumacher, Aug. 16.—Members of the Associated Boards of Trade stood on barrels and boxes in the "clean up" house of the Hollinger this morning and watched \$18,000 in molten gold poured into a mould. The process of refitting happened to be in progress when they walked over to the "Hollinger" this morning, and so they were able to see concrete proof of the wealth of the mine. Later they inspected the gold brick which represented the weekly "clean up" of the McIntyre. At the Dome they witnessed a whole hillside of gold ore being quarried and drawn, a ton and a half in car to the mill, which is now turning out its bullion daily. Some Porcupine paid its respects to the visitors before they entrained for the journey south.

FREEDOM OF GLASGOW PRESENTED TO BORDEN

Canadian Premier Refers to Growing Dominions and Naval Supremacy.

Glasgow, Scotland, Aug. 16.—The freedom of the city of Glasgow was conferred on Mr. Robert Borden, Canadian Premier, by Lord Provost Stevenson. In accepting the honor, Mr. Borden said: "The British dominions grow in power, influence and population greater than these islands, we must realize the need for further modification of our constitutional relations. Certain responsibilities now assumed absolutely by the people of these islands and the Imperial Parliament must be shared by the great overseas dominions. We of the overseas dominions are convinced that the way across the seas must be kept secure. In no other way can the great British Empire keep together. The security of the seas is as essential to the safety of the Empire as is the breath of life to the individual."

MISS NETTIE PARK DIED UNEXPECTEDLY

Came Home to Visit Sick Father and Was Stricken With Paralysis.

AFTER MANY DAYS

Quebec Gets Bank Burglar When He Leaves American Prison.

Boston, Aug. 16.—On his release on parole today from the state prison, where he had served more than eleven years for burglary of a brewery in Lawrence in 1900, Frederick Allen, alias Joseph Huddle, alias John Brown, was rearrested for the Canadian authorities.

Allen is charged with being one of a band of men who robbed the Eastern Townships Bank of Danville, Que., of \$15,000 about two years ago. The robbers were captured in a swamp after a hard fight.

Peter McCaskill, a Canadian Government detective, traced Allen to the state prison here and came to Boston with a warrant for his arrest. Allen agreed to waive extradition rights and go to Montreal with Detective McCaskill.
