SAID FAREWELL TO REV. J. G. INKSTER

Board of Education Made Presentation to Member Who Is Leaving for the West.

ABERDEEN SCHOOL PLANS

Owing to Chairman Dennis' illness the Matter of Making a Choice Was Laid Over.

At a special meeting of the board of education, held Tuesday afternoon, the official farewell to Rev. J. Gibson Inkster, who is shortly to leave for Victoria, B.C., was made by the members of the board.

Mr. John M. Gunn made a brief address expressing the sincere regret felt by the board at his decision to go to the west. During his term Mr. Inkster had done a great deal of work and had taken the deepest interest in matters of education. He had gone into the work with the greatest of enthusiasm, and good results would undoubtedly follow. He had endeavored himself to the members, and they deeply regretted his removal.

"I had consulted us before he made the decision, he undoubtedly would have remained in London," declared Mr. Gunn.

A Presentation.

Secretary McElhannon then presented Mr. Inkster with a very handsome pair of steel engravings.

Mr. Inkster replied briefly to the address of Mr. Gunn, expressing his appreciation of the kind words said of him.

"I have found the sessions of the board decidedly profitable," said Mr. Inkster. "I have received a great deal of good from the meetings, and I am a much better man for having been a member of the board of education."

When the regular business was taken up, Trustee A. M. Hunt presented the report of No. 2 committee on the selection of plans for the new Aberdeen school, presented in the recent competition. He advised allowing the matter to stand over until Chairman E. R. Dennis was present, as he was more familiar with the details of the competition and had taken a deep interest in the work. The board agreed with him.

Salary Raise for Teachers.

Chairman Gunn, of No. 1 committee, presented the report of that committee settling the salaries of the teachers in the recently annexed districts. Principal Duncan, of Balgair, was increased from \$800 to \$1,000, while Principal Garratt, of Pottersburg, was raised from \$750 to \$900. The teachers of the Chelsea Green school were left at \$600 while the assistants were raised from \$450 to \$500.

The Feeble-Minded.

Trustee Inkster presented a report on his visits to Toronto to attend the conference to discuss the problem of the feeble-minded. A number of prominent specialists had presented the problem, and advised that legislation be introduced to prevent the marriage of feeble-minded persons, and the establishment of schools for their education.

Ottawa's Schools.

While at Ottawa he had visited a number of schools and had found them well equipped and of a good type. Many of them were similar to the Alexandra school. Fireproof construction was followed in every particular. The board there employed an architect at a salary of \$2,400 per annum and had found it to be a paying investment. Other matters were dealt with in the report.

Those present at the meeting were Dr. R. W. Shaw, acting chairman; W. T. Strong, A. M. Hunt, W. G. Gamble, J. M. Gunn, Rev. J. G. Inkster, F. H. Greenlee, Dr. P. J. Mukan, Inspector Edwards, Principal McCutcheon and Secretary McElhannon.

BLOCKED THE INTAKE

Tunnel People Were Without Water For Many Hours.

Union Stockyards.

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—The run here today totalled 174 cars, with 3,212 head of cattle, 137 calves, 1,934 sheep and lambs, and 1,235 hogs. Prices for almost every kind of live stock dropped today. Hogs good and common cattle, were all off from last week's quotations, and lambs were easier, although calves and sheep experienced no change. The run of cattle (3,212) was heavy, and consisted of more than the average allotment of light common butchers, while choice heavy steers were rather a scarcity, and, as a consequence, were not included in the general drop of prices. Market for good butchers was from 10c to 15c lower, while for common stock the figures dropped from 15c to 10c. Three loads of heavy steers changed hands at from \$7 to \$7 1/2, but the majority remained steady at \$6 90. Sheep were steady, but lambs were a little easier. Calves were unchanged on a good market, but hogs brought down to \$8 25 for fed and watered stock, and \$7 50 for o. b. Cows ranged from \$4 75 to \$4 75. Cows ranged from \$4 75 to \$5 25 for the best, while bulls went at from \$3 to \$5 25. Canners and cutters sold at from \$2 50 to \$3; calves, good veal, from \$8 50 to \$9, and down to \$3 50 for rougher stuff. Millers and pig raisers were quoted at from \$4 to \$5 each. The best lambs went at from \$8 to \$8 75; light ewes at \$4 75 to \$5 25, and heavy ewes from \$3 to \$5 50. Hogs were sold at \$5 25, fed and watered, and \$7 50 for o. b. Representatives transacted for Fay & Wilson sold 15 loads cattle from \$5 50 to \$6 85; cows, \$4 to \$5 25; Crawford & Co. sold three loads butler steers, 1,300 lbs, at \$7 to \$7 10; one load heifers, 950 lbs, \$8 30; 50 cows, \$4 75 to \$5; seven loads, 1,000 to 1,000 lbs, \$5 to \$6; C. C. H. Mayhew bought one load stockers, 300 lbs, \$4 90 to \$5 35; one load butchers, \$5 50; W. J. Neely (Mathews, Laine Co.) bought 200 butchers, good, \$5 to \$6 65; medium, \$5 50 to \$5 90; cows, \$4 50 to \$5 25; McCurdy bought one load butchers, 950 lbs, at \$8.
