WITCH OF THE BLACK FOREST FORE. CAST GERMANY'S DOWNFALL

That disas er and disruption would overtake the German Empire in the year 1914 was presaged as early as 1849, when the assassination of Emperor William I. was attempted. The story predicting the downfall of Germany came from the witch of the Black Forest, near Berlin. It has been told and retold, but is of interest just now, especially as it is revived in a letter received by City Engineer W. N. Ashplant from a friend of his in London.

The story follows. Emperor William I. asked the witch of the Black Forest in 1849 to push aside the mystic curtains of futurity for him. She gave him this table: Attempted assassination....1849 Franco-German war1871 Death of William!!

1888 Greatest prosperity 1913

It will be seen by this table that the figures of the years are added to the last column to bring out the period of the witch's prediction. In announcing the 1913 forecast she declared it would be the greatest year of prosperity in the history of the German Empire and would be immediately followed by disruption and disaster.
