## ASKING FORGIVENESS, IS MURDERED INSTEAD

Young New Jersey Man Shot Down by Father-in-Law After Secret Marriage.

Haverstraw, N. Y., July 24.—In his cell in the county jail at New York, where he was taken after he had shot and killed Eugene B. Newman, his 19-year-old son-in-law, William V. Cleary, prominent in county politics, and for fourteen years town clerk, refused today to discuss the murder or tell why he shot the young man.

Young Newman, son of one of the owners of the Rockland County Messenger, secretly married Cleary's 18-year-old daughter, Anna Cleary, last Saturday in Weehawken, N. J. Yesterday the couple confided in their respective mothers, and Newman was advised to tell Cleary and ask his forgiveness.

It was while on this mission that Newman was shot. He entered the town clerk's office, where Cleary was talking with three friends, Bernard Fox, a brewery agent; Patrolman Sheridan and Joseph Pelter, county supervisor.

Newman extended his hand and asked for Cleary's blessing. Cleary, with hardly a word, and before his friends could interfere, fired four bullets into the young man's body.

Newman died instantly. Cleary shortly afterwards surrendered himself to the authorities.

Marriage Was Expected.

Newman and Anna Cleary had been sweethearts for their first meeting, six years ago. It was an established thing in the village that Newman was to marry Anna. His parents, however, showed just, and Cleary shortly afterwards, although it is said, he did not look upon it with favor.

## "FRAUD" AND "QUACK" NOT LIBELLOUS WORDS

British Court Justifies Their Use by the Medical Association.

London, July 24.—The British Medical Association has obtained a verdict in a libel suit which occupied the bench division for several days. The action was brought by C. H. Stevens, who claimed to have discovered a cure for tuberculosis by means of a South African herb called Unchadobou. In a book entitled "Secret Remedies" in which the British Medical Association exposed a large number of so-called cures, Mr. Stevens was called a "fraud" and a "quack."

The jury found that the words complained of were not libellous, and that the comments were fair.

## MILITANTS ARRESTED AT KING'S PALACE

Insisted On Presenting Petition to His Majesty in Person.

London, July 24.—Two suffragettes, belonging to the British nobility, Lady Clary and the Hon. Miss Edith Fitzgerald, were arrested today at Buckingham Palace, where they made persistent attempts to present to King George a letter written by his majesty to Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader.

The letter demanded a personal interview with the King, and claimed that the suffragettes should be given the same right to an interview as certain militant men, namely: Sir Edward Carson, Capt. James Craig, John Dillon, and John E. Redmond, who had, she pointed out, been invited to Buckingham Palace by the King on his own initiative.

The two women arrived at the entrance to the palace this morning carrying a large scroll prettily draped with purple ribbon streamers. They stated that they had a petition to present to his majesty. The attendants, however, persuaded them to leave, but they returned later and announced their determination to remain until they were given an audience with the King.

The police then conducted the two women in custody, and conducted them to the nearest police station.

## RUSSIAN STRIKERS FACE MACHINE GUNS

Tolerance Shown During the French President's Visit Disappears When He Departs.

St. Petersburg, July 24.—Stern measures were taken by the authorities today to suppress the strike which have been in progress for several days in the streets of the capital, during which a large number of casualties have occurred in the conflicts between the police and Cossacks on one hand and the striking workmen on the other.

The Iron Hand.

Considerable tolerance was shown during the presence here of President Poincaré, of the French Republic, but immediately after his departure for Stockholm last night, four regiments of cavalry of the guard and two regiments of Cossacks under the command of Gen. Kasanof, arrived from Krasnoyarsk to assist in suppressing the disorders.

They brought with them a number of quick-firing machine guns. A squadron of the newly-arrived cavalry at once came into contact with the strikers, charging and dispersing a crowd of them.

The authorities estimate the number of strikers at 135,000, but it is believed the total is greater.

## PEACEFUL TRANSFER OF GOVERNMENT PROBABLE

Carranza's Assurances, With His Evident Anxiety for Peace, Point This Way.

Washington, July 24.—Hopes for the peaceful transfer of government in Mexico were strengthened today by advice from John R. Silliman, President Wilson's personal representative, that he had been assured by Carranza that his disposition of the claim for amnesty for the fallen Federalists would not be such as to prejudice the cause of the Constitutionalists in the eyes of the United States and other foreign powers.

Entire confidence could be placed in his attitude, he added, not only toward the proposition of safety guarantee, but also toward the request for amnesty.

Confidence over the ultimate course that Villa, the northern military chief, will pursue, was expressed here today.

President Wilson, however, said he thought Carranza would not cause any trouble. Some Mexicans in Washington assert that Villa intends patiently to await a transfer of power to the Constitutionalists after which he will make vigorous demands upon Carranza for participation in the new government or promotion for his own adherents.

## ENGLISH PRESS IS VERY PESSIMISTIC

Does Not See Any Chance of Ulster Conference Reaching Agreement.

London, July 24.—The London morning papers all regard the chances of the home rule conference arriving at an agreement as very slender.

The Morning Post insists that the position is hopeless.

The Mail and other papers assert that the Government has submitted fresh proposals, including Sir Edward Grey's suggestion of home rule within home rule for Ulster, and a new suggestion by Speaker Lowther that Tyrone should be excluded for two years, and then take a ballot on the question. But to all of these modified proposals, John Redmond and Sir Edward Carson have proved completely irreconcilable.

The papers add that the conference will meet today to draw up a final report, which will leave no hope, unless negotiations outside the conference should succeed.

According to the Liverpool Daily Post, one of the leading Liberal newspapers, it is frankly acknowledged that the effort made by the conference at Buckingham Palace to reconcile the conflicting views of the Irish Nationalists and the Ulster Unionists must be abandoned.

## A PROMINENT EDUCATOR OF TORONTO UNIVERSITY WHO DIED THIS WEEK

DR. JOHN GALBRAITH, dean of the faculty of applied sciences and engineering in the University of Toronto, who died suddenly this week at Go Home Bay, Georgian Bay, a summer resort which he founded.

## DOMINION ALLIANCE SECRETARY TO STAY

John H. Roberts Withdraws Resignation On Committee's Request.

Montreal, July 24.—John H. Roberts has withdrawn his resignation as secretary of the Dominion Alliance. The committee appointed to consider it, Mr. Roberts resigned under the impression that the Dominion Alliance in electing to continue opposition to the license commission, had made a reflection on himself because of his public statement that he would not appear before a body in which he has no confidence. The committee, however, expressly absolved him from the necessity of appearing before the license commission.

At the request of the committee, Mr. Roberts also consented to withdraw an action for ten thousand dollars against J. H. Carson, a member of the alliance, as the result of an interview which Mr. Carson had criticized the secretary.

## NOTED RUSSIAN EDITOR DIES IN ST. PETERSBURG.

St. Petersburg, July 24.—Prince Meshchersky, editor of Grashdanin, died here yesterday.

Early in 1905, months before the conclusion of peace between Russia and Japan, Prince Meshchersky, in an article in his paper, advised the Government promptly to conclude peace, saying: "Let us have the heroic strength to confess defeat before the world." The confession of peace will prove the salvation of the country by averting internal shipwreck.

Prince Meshchersky was exceedingly active in political affairs and gave free expression to his opinions in his paper. In 1914 he was sent for a week's imprisonment for publishing revelations regarding the mutiny on the vessels of the Baltic fleet the previous year.

Just before the salute was fired, Miss Fisher, who is known among the Pythians as "General" Fisher, listened to a band concert given in her honor by the Ohio Brigade.
