LLOYD GEORGE AND BRIAND TO DISCUSS PENALTIES

Lympne, Eng., April 23.-Exchanges which have been going on for some weeks between the British and French foreign offices relative to what can and bught to be done to collect reparations from Germany will be continued here late today by Premier Lloyd George and Premier Briand. The two states-men will meet at the villa of Sir Philip Sassoon, where they have held confer-ences in the past.

The French plan is, broadly, a project for administration and taxing for the benefit of the Allies the Ruhr coal basin and some parts of the Westphal-ian industrial district of Germany. Mr. Lloyd George arrived at Sir Philip's villa Bolcaire, last night and advices from Paris today stated that M. Briand, ac-companied by Philippe J. L. Berthelot, general secretary of the French foreign office, had left at 8:40 o'clock this morning for England. The two premiers were understood today to be in agreement as to the general plan to be followed, but it was said they wished to have a com-plete mutual understanding of what was to be done early in May. If in the interval the German Government does not submit acceptable proposals. Information gathered here this morn-

ing indicated that Germany's latest offer to assist in the reconstruction of deva-stated areas in France and Belgium would not be probable to exert any influ-ence on the deliberations of the French and British premiers. It was pointed out that Germany made a similar sug-gestion at the London conference early in March, and that it was not seriously considered. On that occasion France replied she had already spent upwards of £1,000,000,000 on reconstruction and looked for Germany to remunerate her. It appears that the present German Government is in a weak position, infor-mation to this effect being received from ommissions in Berlin.

BERLIN SENDS A REPLY TO U. S. NOTE OF REFUSAL

London, April 23.—Germany has sent to Washington a reply to the United States note, rejecting the role of ar-bitrator of the reparations question between Germany and the Alies, says Central News dispatch from Berlin The terms of the note sent to President Harding were not divulged to party leaders up to the time it was dispatched at noon today, and its con-tents will not be made known until later in the day. Leading politicians declared to have been angry because members of the cabinet did not consult them before the original communica tion was sent to the United States.

Water Has Risen Six Feet in Past Forty-Eight Hours.

CAR TRACKS UNDERMINED

Part of Abutment at Wellington St. Bridge Swept Away During the Night.

The River Thames has risen about six feet within the last 48 hours and the flood is still increasing. On the south branch of the river the current is sweeping down with terrific force, and the water is of a deep brown tint At the Wellington Street Bridge the great rise in the volume of water is very apparent, and during the night one of the abutments at the south end of the bridge was considerably damaged by the rushing river. Owing to the collapse of the boarding which pro-tected the embankment at this point, tons of earth gave way and were pre-

As the street railway crosses the oridge part of the track was under-nined by the washout, and thus rendered unfit for traffic. The result was that this morning the cars on the Richmond route were held up at the north end of the bridge and passengers further up the hill on High street had to walk that part of the trip.
