## **Premier Hughes Submits** Wireless Scheme To **Parliament**

LONDON, Nov. 25.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Premier William Hughes has submitted to the Australian House of Representatives the details of the prosentatives the details of the pro-posed direct wireless scheme be-tween Australia and the United Kingdom, according to a cable from Reuter's Melbourne corre-spondent. The commonwealth and the Amalgamated Wireless Company will jointly become re-sponsible for finescing the sponsible for financing the scheme, the premier stated, and the commonwealth will secure the controlling interest.

The commonwealth and Amal gamated Wireless Company will forthwith construct high-power stations to carry a direct com-mercial service between Austra-lia, the United Kingdom and Canada, according to the agree-ment. The main trunk stations are to be erected within two years. The rates generally he two-thirds of the existing cable charges.
