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MAIMED REMAINED IN CHATHAM COURT

Big List of Cases Came Up Before County Magistrate Arnold.

LOVERS LANE CHARGE

Chatham, Aug. 24.—Remands were the order of the day in the big docket cases in the county police court. Magistrate B. Arnold presided and had his hands full of the latter part of the morning and all afternoon.
Harry Trudell of Ringold was remanded for trial until Monday next. He is charged with indecent assault, preferred against him by Mrs. Nellie LeTourneau, stealing of a machine, broken down car on the river road, Dover township, one night, by a county police patrol, and the machine was maimed the necessary markers.
Andrew Ritchie was charged with carrying a concealed weapon, a loaded revolver, contrary to the criminal code. He admitted that he had the weapon in his pocket, but stated that it was necessary to tote a gun in his neighborhood. As other charges were preferred against him in connection with alleged O. T. A. infractions, his case was also laid over until Monday next.
Alphy Toulouse, 8th concession, Dover, was remanded until Monday next. He is charged with having liquor for sale, and escaping from custody, after being placed under arrest. Toulouse is the man who gave county police officers a merry chase after he saturated Chief Pettis of the county police with a bucket of moonshine.
Fines of \$5 and costs, \$19 in all, were imposed upon Thomas Siddall and J. Halliday for indulging in a crap game on August 6. The ended with a fight and a choice selection of abusive language.
A case of stealing of a bicycle, laid by Peter Devost against Gilbert Reaume, was dismissed, as it was a civil action for settlement pending between the parties, which, it is stated, will take care of this matter.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR AUGUST 26.
BARNABAS THE GREAT-HEARTED.
Barnabas the Great-Hearted.
Scripture Lesson: Acts 4:36, 37; 9:26-30. Golden Text: Acts 11:24.

Does goodness make a man effeminate? Our modern nick-name "goody-goody" suggests this. Nevertheless, some of the most manly men of history and of modern life have been good men in the noblest sense of the word: God's men! Christian men!

Barnabas was a great man because he was a good man. He may not have become as famous as his co-worker, Paul, as far as earth is concerned, yet he surely is as famous in heaven, for it was he who really led Paul into the Christian ministry. The church did not take kindly to the idea of Saul the Persecutor becoming a preacher, and it was Barnabas who allayed their fears. Acts 9:26, 27.

Barnabas sought Paul out and persuaded him to enter the active ministry. Acts 11:25, 26. Barnabas was able to succeed in this because his own whole-hearted consecration to Christ and his church had endowed him with nobility of character. A consecrated life always becomes a transfigured life. And it was this transfigured life which gave Barnabas his name, for Barnabas was really a nickname, lovingly given by the apostles, meaning "the son of prophecy, of exhortation, or of consolation." A gifted preacher and a friendly man, Barnabas the nickname comes a good name, given you indicate the noble qualities of the reverse? Some of the noble qualities of Barnabas were:

1. His great-heartedness. Abundant goodness is the first thing we notice about him. Acts 4:36, 37. He was a wealthy man, yet he gave up his wealth freely for love of the Lord Jesus. If a man is thoroughly a Christian, the nerve which runs from his brain to his tongue, his great-heartedness also reveals itself in abounding friendliness, even the friendless persecutor, Saul, Acts 9:26-27. Who can tell how much the Christ-like friendliness of Barnabas helped Saul to become Paul the Apostle?

2. "He was a good man." Acts 11:24. Goodness in this case really means "God-likeness." Christians are "Christ-ones," and their characters should reveal true likeness to their Master.
3. "Full of the Holy Ghost." Acts 11:24. Goodness in this case really means, if only comes through the power of the indwelling Spirit of God. And true Christians may daily enjoy the uplifting companionship of their God.
"Walking with Thee, my God, Like as a child, Leans on his father's strength, Crossing the wild, His father's way is taught, Lessons of holy thought, Faith undimmed."

4. "Full of faith." Acts 11:24. And his faith made him good. Life's friendly, noble and good. Life's supreme lesson is this: "Have faith in God!"
