INCENDIARISM AT SARINIA.
A Case That Seems to Have Arisen From Mingled Motives.
Sarnia, Sept. 18.—About one o'clock this morning Mrs. Goodrich, who keeps a small cigar and candy store on Front street, was arrested on a charge of attempted burning of the Russell estate, in which her store is located. Mrs. Goodrich had left the building shortly after eleven o'clock, and a few minutes later a smell of coal oil caused her store to be opened, when a franc periton was found on the floor. Officer Survis on the order of Chief Wiedred, began a search for Mrs. Goodrich, and after some time found her at Fitzgibbon's Hotel, where she had taken a room for the night. She had previously fled back to her store. She was arrested and taken to the lock-up in the city, where it is stated that she had yesterday quarrelled with a lady who lives over the store.

A THRILLING EXPERIENCE.
Through a Steam Ditching Machine and Livestock to Tell the Sensations.
Windsor, Sept. 18.—While out rating a steam tiling machine at Marshfield the other day, Engineer John Barnes had a narrow escape from an instant and horrible death.

When the ponderous ditching machinery was in motion the engineer stationed some fifty feet in front of the boiler and reached forward among the revolving wheels to throw the machine out of gear by means of a lever. In this position the set-screw of a wheel caught the clothing and skin of his right arm, and the engineer was instantly thrown over the revolving shaft and fell into the cog-wheel, and other gearing. At this moment Chas. Postry, who noticed the accident, rushed forward and seized the helpless engineer; by superhuman strength pulled him clear of the gearing. Barnes came out alive but almost devoid of clothing.

Some idea of his distress is shown which the engineer had been had from the fact that when he reached forward to pull the lever he wore an engineer's blouse, a vest, shirt, collar, etc., and in an instant later, when Postry laid his bruised body on the sod his wearing apparel was reduced to trousers and shoes. Not a vestige of clothing remained on the upper part of his body.

Barnes passing through the gearing of the tiling machine and around the shaft, even once without being instantly killed is nothing short of miraculous. He was taken to Kinsville and had his shoulder and arm bandaged by Dr. King.
Barnes' miraculous escape can be attributed to chance and the physical strength of Postry, who succeeded in pulling him from the revolving wheels.

THE FIRE RECORD.

PAT PURRELL'S WILL.
Toronto, Sept. 17.—Judge Robertson has decreed that the goods owned by the late Pat Purcell, M.P. of Cornwall, Ont., in 1891, revived his will of 1890, by which \$400,000 was left to charitable institutions. A few of the bequests, however, are held to be void under the Mortmain Act.

A CRISIS FEARED.
Far-reaching Effects of the Baring Failure.
A SERIES OF WHOLESALE FORGERIES.

Clubs, Newspapers and Mercantile Establishments Affected - A Robber's Burden by Brigands - A Diplomat Loses His Job - General News for the Continent.

Advices from Sofia are to the effect that a messenger of the British Government, bearing despatches for the British Embassy at Constantinople, has been held at Teerabad and ordered back to quarantine for three days.
An Importation of Horses.
The stamping Nomasie, which sailed from Liverpool for New York yesterday, has on board 50 two-year-old horses, among them is Camilleas, a brother of St. Baise, and the mare Ormutu, b. Hampton, out of Bric-a-brac. Ormutu is insured for £1,000.

Dastardly Work of Brigands.
A despatch from Cagliari, Sardinia, says thirty armed brigands attacked the residence of the parish priest at Zedda, last night, and stole all the money and valuables they could find. The priest and his servant were seriously wounded, and a villager who went to their assistance was shot dead.

Redmond R. B. Morley.
Wm. H. Redmond, the Paroellette who represents East Clare in the House of Commons, has written a letter in reference to midnight expedition of bailiffs to seize cattle belonging to tenants on the Ballysade estate in Clare, Mr. Redmond, in his letter, points out to Mr. Morley that he is a man of armed police at midnight to hunt the cattle of poor people who under the circumstances are unable to pay it, rent is not calculated to bring about a peaceful solution of the Irish difficulty.

An Undiplomatic Diplomat.
Rome, Sept. 17.—Newspapers here publish statements to the effect that Baron Savio, Italian Minister to the United States, was recalled from his post by reason of his action in connection with the differences of opinion in the Italian colony in New York, in which he took sides against the Italian Consul-General at New York. It is asserted positively as will not return to Washington.

A Maniac Attempts a Terrible Leap.
Berlin, Sept. 17.—Miss Clotilde F. Fieses, said to be the widow of a prominent New York physician, was in a hotel in this city and to-day she suddenly became raving mad. Her roomers on the fourth floor of the hotel and dashing to a window she attempted to throw herself to the street. Persons passing saw her and shouted at her to get back. This diverted her attention and prevented her immediate jump. A fireman rushed upstairs and grasped her around the waist. She fought like a tigress and it was with the greatest difficulty that she was secured.

Atrocities of Brigands.
London, Sept. 17.—The British Consul at Palermo, in a report to the Foreign Office, gives startling details of the operations of brigands in Sicily. The band led by Samana is the most terrible. The outrages perpetrated by them call for speedy vengeance. This band has committed many murders characterized by the greatest cruelty. They have beheaded little boys and girls, cut their bodies in halves and then thrown the remains round about the country for dogs and hogs to eat. Many land owners who have incurred the enmity of the brigands have been treacherously assassinated while others who have fallen into their hands have been condemned to death by slow torture.

A Financial Crisis Predicted.
London, Sept. 17.—Lloyd and Water declare that a financial crisis, which first took serious expression in the Baring oil lapse, is becoming more active. The situation is rendered worse by the artificial efforts made during the past two years to postpone the inevitable result. Within past twenty-four hours seven clubs in the West End have been indefinitely closed, and half the London journals are on the verge of disaster. Five of the largest estates in England are being sold, several large commercial firms of hitherto good standing are now dis-trusted and the number of well known men, prominent as society entertainers, is vanishing. The writer instances the collapse of the Lyric Club, one of the "smartest" in England, with an aristocratic and wealthy membership. This club was seemingly highly prosperous, and most of the directors were wealthy. It was an extremely profitable concern. Suddenly a charge of wholesale forgery was brought against Captain Sangers, a member of the club, who was arrested at Liverpool just as he was about boarding a steamer for the West Indies and the whole fabric crumbled to dust. One prominent individual is reported to have lost £70,000, another £20,000, while a third feared that he would be made bankrupt. The club itself was ruined.

Reforms in Prussia.
Berlin, Sept. 18.—The Prussian Diet will meet during the second week in November. It will consider the question of reforming the electoral system. The new system of taxation has impelled the proposed reform. The Prussian system, which was designed to give aristocrats supremacy, must be modified. The bill will not propose all that the Freisinnige party desires. It still retains the plan of grouping the electors in classes according to taxation, but lowers the qualifications to vote. Among the first bills to be introduced in the Reichstag will be one giving the imperial health office control of the sanitary regulations of the whole of Germany. The different laws now existing in each of the federated states make joint action impossible. The epidemic of cholera, as shown by the necessity for a central authority controlling sanitation of the empire. The Reichstag will adopt the bill without much debate. The negotiations for a commercial entente with Russia have resulted in a definite project.

which was presented to the Finance Ministry at St Petersburg on Thursday. Germany offers to reduce the tariff on cereals, alcohols, hides, petroleum and other oils in exchange for lower Russian duties on cloth, iron, coal and all kinds of machinery. The Foreign Office here expect an early agreement.

Mr. William Walter Phelps, the American Minister, has returned to Berlin from Baden.
The Spanish Government has decided to declare October 12th a perpetual national holiday in commemoration of the discovery of America.
Prof. B. Ramon, who has been summoned from Switzerland to consult with the physicians attending the American General Anderson, informs the representative of the Associated Press that the general is suffering with cancer of the stomach. He further says that the patient cannot possibly recover.

THE BUCK MURDER TRIAL.
The Prisoner is Found Guilty, But May Not Hang.
Moncton, N. B., Sept. 18.—At Porechester yesterday the murder trial of Buck closed. The Judge charged strongly against the prisoner on every point, and the jury were only out one hour and a quarter. One jurymen was for "manslaughter" and the other eleven for "wilful murder." The solitary jurymen agreed to a verdict of "wilful murder" provided a recommendation to mercy was tacked on. The jury thus reached a unanimous verdict at 6 o'clock. The prisoner was brought into court, and while listening to the verdict he played with a dog which had strayed into his box. The silence of the grave fell over all and not even the buzz of conversation greeted the verdict. The prisoner said nothing in court but asked for a lawyer to fight for death sentence, which will be passed when Jim's trial, which commences Monday, is closed. When Buck was taken back to jail he cried the Judge, Peter Jarroll, Sheriff McQueen and everybody. He asked the American Consul to appeal, he said, for protection to the American Government and would demand a great many more in the States this fall. He did not consent to a conversation narrated by Carroll the following conversation took place: -
"What do you think it is, Jim?"
"That's what it is, Jim?"
"Well, it's not right!"
"Buck gave a forced laugh and said: -
"Such is life."
"Jim replied, 'If I may be in as bad a box as you are on Tuesday or Wednesday.'
"Buck - 'I got a recommendation to mercy.'
"Jim - 'I may not then be a top after all.'"
Public opinion here unanimously indorsed the verdict of the jury.

RAILWAY RUN-IN.
Several Train Hands and One Passenger Injured.
Wilkesbore, Pa., Sept. 17.—An empty engine collided with a passenger train on the Lehigh Valley RR. this morning in a deep cut near Penobscot. Both engines and the baggage car were derailed, the engine being almost totally wrecked, Anderson Brown, of this city, engineer of the passenger train, was scalded by steam and hot water and otherwise severely injured. Harry Custay, his fireman, while trying to stop the engine, was struck on the head by the engine. The conductor, who was in the baggage car, had his head injured. Wm. F. Deeterline, baggage man, and nephew of the conductor, was hurled to one end of the car and badly bruised and injured about the body. The only passenger injured was a woman named Anna Sawicki, of Mahanoy City. She was thrown against a stove and fell fainting to the floor of the car. Her injuries are internal and are said to be serious.

OUR CENTENNIAL.
The New Parliament Buildings Opened to Celebrate the Event.
Toronto, Sept. 18.—The hundredth anniversary of the first meeting of the Upper Canadian Parliament was celebrated here yesterday by the formal opening of the new Ontario Parliament buildings. Address was delivered by Lt.-Gov. Kirkpatrick and other Provincial notables, and intervals between them were taken up by school children singing patriotic songs. The buildings have been six years in course of construction and will not be completely finished for a year yet. The cost will be about a million and a-half.

HE WAS A GAOL BIRD.
The Man Who Deserted His Girl- Wife at Harrow, Was Just Out of Penitentiary.
Ridgeway, Sept. 18.—It turns out that the man who represented himself at Harrow as Dr. Earl W. Woodbridge, of Detroit, was really a man named Woodhouse, from near London, Ont., who had just served a three years' term in Kingston penitentiary. The girl, whom he married and deserted, was named Nellie Gibson, and came from Deer Lake, Mich. He has not again shown himself in Harrow, and the woman left the day after he did. A number of people having given her enough money to pay her board and purchase a railway ticket to Detroit.

Killed While at Labor.
Shelburne, Ont., Sept. 18.—A fatal accident occurred about four miles from here about 3 o'clock this afternoon which cost Mr. James McKivern his life. He was engaged in hauling in oats, and was going down a steep hill, when he in some way fell off the load, the wagon passing over his head, killing him instantly.

LABELLE NO MURDER.
The Judge Found No Case to go to the Jury.

Enthusiastic Frenchmen applaud the Finding of the Court.
Ottawa, September 17.—At the Assizes to-day the case of L. C. Labelle, late employe of the Government Printing Bureau, charged with murdering his wife by administering carbolic acid in December last, continued till after three o'clock. The evidence of the Crown was lengthened, but when exhausted Justice Armour considered there was no case to go before the jury, and recommended no defence. Prisoner's counsel then moved for his discharge, which was granted amid applause from the French portion of the spectators. The disturbance was promptly suppressed by the Judge. This ended the Fall Assizes Court.

THE ANGLICAN SYNOD.
Steps Taken towards the Proposed Consolidation.
Montreal, Sept. 17.—At a day's session of the Anglican Synod the principal question was a conference between the bishops and the Lower House on the proposed consolidation of the various sections of the church in Canada as proposed in the scheme formulated at the Winoipeg conference. The scheme proposed the establishment of a General Synod, including representatives from all the ecclesiastical provinces in the Dominion, the first meeting of which will be held in Toronto, Ont., in 1893. The conference lasted three hours, and there was a great deal of discussion, many of the speakers objecting to the establishment of a general synod on the ground that it would interfere with the Provincial Synods. Dean Grisdale, prolocutor of the Province of Rupert's Land, and Canon O'Meara, of Winoipeg, appeared before the conference and declared that the Province of Rupert's Land, which embraced eight dioceses, would heartily agree to consolidation if the Province of Ontario was retained. No decision was reached at the conference, but the question will come up for final decision before the end of the synod. Memorials of regret were adopted of the Metropolitan Bishop Medley, of Fredericton, and Bishop Williams, of Quebec.

A WIFE'S AWFUL CRIME.
Mrs. Cheney Poisoned Her Husband With Rough on Hats.
Keweenaw, Wis., Sept. 18.—Frank Cheney is 15 years of age, has had his mother arrested on the charge of poisoning his father. His brother, John, 16 years old, and sister Theresa, 13, were also implicated, the latter having made a full confession. The story as told by Theresa is that her father and mother had quarrelled about a year ago. Joan told the mother that she did not poison the father, he would leave home. Mrs. Cheney bought rough on hats. She put some of this into his coffee. She also baked some of it in a pie, which she ate. When he became violently sick Mrs. Cheney went for medicine for him. Into this also she put the deadly drug, and Mr. Cheney died in dreadful agony.

DOMINION DOINGS.
Latest News from all Sections of the Country.
Premier Abbott presided at Saturday's meeting of the Cabinet and will attend another meeting next week.

The consecration of the new Bishop of Quebec, Rev. A. Duroy, took place yesterday at Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal.
The Government has renewed the contract with the Allan Steamship Co. for carrying of the trans-Atlantic mail for the year commencing 24th December upon the old terms.
Dr. A. R. C. Selwyn, C. M. G. of the Geological survey, has just left for Banff and the Rocky Mountain Park, where it is the Government's intention to establish a museum exhibiting the natural resources of the district. The museum is to be near the National Park road, close to the Spray, and will contain specimens of the flora, fauna and minerals of the district. Dr. Selwyn will be absent about three weeks.
